Rector's letter

Dear Friends

As the days begin to lengthen and we leave February behind us, I begin to think about March and what we might celebrate along with the flowers and additional daylight - St Patrick of course!

I must begin by greeting our actual Irish neighbours here in Braunston – thank you for allowing the rest of us to hijack your feast day! I also wonder how many of us have a little bit of Irish in us – either genetically or metaphorically. Like a lot of Australians, I have ancestors who made a very large voyage by sea from the Emerald Isle many years ago – voluntarily in my case! Australia owes much of its sense of humour to the Irish too, along, perhaps, with its drinking habits! So I'm quite happy to celebrate St Patrick, Ireland, and Irishness, with a little bit of a reflection on the life of the great man himself (with a little help from Wikipedia).

Patrick was born in the 4th Century, near the end of Roman rule in Britain. He described his life with some modesty in his *Confessio*, written towards the end of his life. In it, we learn that at the age of 16, he was captured and taken into slavery in Ireland. As traumatic as his experience was, he became aware that God was with him and recollects that.

"He guarded me before I knew him, and before I came to wisdom and could distinguish between good and evil. He protected me and consoled me as a father does his son."

He eventually escaped back to Britain, and to his family, where he became a cleric. He then felt called on to return to the very place of his captivity to share his faith in the good news of a loving, forgiving God. He said:

"I cannot be silent ... about such great blessings and such a gift that the Lord so kindly bestowed in the land of my captivity. This is how we can repay such blessings when our lives change and we come to know God, to praise and bear witness to his great wonders."

Famously, he used the shamrock to illustrate that God is at once a Father who cares, a Son who walks with us, and a Spirit who guides





our steps.

Patrick was someone who, with God's help, was able to use the difficulties he experienced and, with humility and creativity, turn them to good. He didn't have an easy life, but he had a good one. He had purpose, and he was aware of the presence of God's Spirit within him. Reflecting at the end of his life, he knew he was as human as the rest of us, but he was able to say this:

"So I want to give thanks to God without ceasing. He frequently forgave my lack of wisdom and my negligence ... I was not quick to accept what he showed me, and so the Spirit prompted me. The Lord was merciful to me a thousand thousand times."

I'll definitely be raising a glass of something to Patrick on the 17th. And I might just have a little think about what he still has to teach us roughly 1700 years later.

Hedge planting

There will be a delivery of more native hedge plants this month. They will be planted by an enthusiastic gang of volunteers at the field between Nibbits Lane and Butchers Bridge. The canes and tree-guards show how far was covered in the first stage. In this second stage on 16th March the line of hedging will be continued up to the junction of paths and will continue around the corner to start a new hedge next to the path that leads to Cross Lane. We are grateful to Liz and Phil for rehabilitating this field and improving habitats there.

Rainfall and water quality in Braunston

We are planning to look at data to find out about the effect of climate change on rainfall in Braunston. This is appropriate in parts of the country where floods have led to water pollution as the sewage treatment plants become overwhelmed. In our February meeting John Pomfret passed on information about sources of data to investigate this.

Spring mowing

It is planned that the verge at Butlin's Hill will be mown this month. The cuttings will be removed so that they do not fertilise the soil. This will gradually weaken the grass and allow more colour, interest and biodiversity to develop.

What can we do about climate change?

We are a group of Braunston people who are promoting policies and taking local action about climate change. We have a busy and evolving project list including EV charging points, active travel, the tree trail and many more. Canons Ashby, National Trust Property

Spring is coming (I promise), and although it may be a bit hit and miss with the weather, we have the lovely carpet of snowdrops in the gardens, just in time for re-opening for the season.

The doors to the main house have been closed since Christmas, but it's been a hive of activity behind them. Although conservation is a 365 days of the year job, the early start to the year allows for a much deeper clean of the spaces and collection.

Each showroom in the house consists of ceiling to floor vacuuming of ceilings, walls and floors and the cleaning and condition checks of all the furniture, textiles, and objects. Rugs are also vacuumed both front and back, both sides of the underlay and the floor beneath the underlay (this helps control carpet beetle). The floorboards are waxed and buffed and the stone floors given a gentle wet clean, all carried out on hands and knees, thank goodness the team have knee pads!

In the Great Kitchen the mobile scaffold goes up so that the higher levels can be reached. The space is covered with an array of working lights, trestle tables, dust sheets, many different brushes, various vacuums, and other housekeeping tools which make up the National Trust cleaning kit. Most objects are removed to the trestle tables and furniture is moved as the full round the room clean is completed.

At Canons Ashby we have Conservation Volunteers which really makes all the difference in getting through hundreds of objects and numerous rooms!

The deep clean went well this year, and the only mini drama to disrupt was a little toad hiding in a dark, damp corner behind a table. He was put outside and crawled off; perhaps he was a good omen for the year ahead!
