Vicar's Letter

Your church needs you!

Anyone visiting All Saint's churchyard/cemetery recently will have seen that the grass in some parts of the churchyard/cemetery in Church Road has grown considerably. The shrubbery, hedges and weeds have also become rather overgrown, and the parochial church council (PCC) is very sorry for any distress this may have caused those visiting loved one's graves and those who have had to negotiate the uneven ground when attending a funeral.

The responsibility for maintaining the churchyard/cemeteries falls to the PCC and we have been very grateful to the Parish Council for their help and support with the grass cutting. This support however is temporary, and a more sustainable solution needs to be found. The PCC paid a contractor to cut back the overgrown shrubbery, bushes and weeds during the autumn which made a vast improvement.

The church has had a considerable reduction in its income over the past year. Parish churches do not receive funding from the national church and so we are dependent on local funding. We have not been able to hold any fundraising events and the giving from our church community is not sufficient to cover our current costs.

After further investigation I have discovered how other villages with church cemeteries operate and it appears that many of them have a team of volunteers from the village who help maintain their cemeteries. I wondered whether this could be possible in Braunston? Would you be willing to partner with us?

- 1. We need a working party to help for a day or half day or just a few hours to clear the cemetery of the overgrown shrubbery etc
- 2. Could you be part of a team of volunteers that would help maintain the cemetery once it is in a more manageable state?
- 3. Would you consider contributing towards the cost of mowing the grass or be willing to cut the grass? If there are a few volunteers, we could form a rota.


Food Share and Care

We entered July to the sound of children playing outside in the bright, warm sunshine wearing their sunhats, keeping hydrated and liberally covered in suncream. Let me rephrase that – we entered July (the height of summer) to the sound of water crashing down to earth in heavy downpours and

the sounds of children and staff screaming as they became soaked through without a moment's notice!

Open Gardens was well supported with a steady stream of visitors taken on a tour of the school grounds to admire the horticulture carefully tended throughout the year by Sue Barnwell and Sue Allinson. We look forward to reaping the rewards of our work when we harvest our vegetable patch.

Our Covid restricted sports events were held in small bubbles and no spectators were allowed – similar to how the Tokyo Olympics will now be run. After a wet and chilly start, the pool has been regularly used to improve water confidence of all children and ensure that by the end of year 6 they can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres using a range of strokes.

This year we also entered a team from Years 5 and 6 into to the world of sequins and glitter by joining Strictly Schools UK at The Deco, Northampton. It was a fantastic experience for all the pupils who took part, they thoroughly enjoyed it and would like to have the opportunity to take part again. Mrs Storer worked hard on getting them all glitter ball ready!

Our in house residential was thoroughly enjoyed by all Year 6 children and staff alike and a new Braunston record was set for the earliest time that all children fell asleep at 11:30pm – despite their protests that no

sleep was had! The children took part in an amazing residential displaying all the school values as they climbed, launched rockets, travelled on a canal boat and created metal sculptures amongst many other activities. Their behaviour was exemplary. I am very grateful to all the staff for the hard work that goes into organising such an experience, creating life long memories.

As I put together our final contribution for the BVN for our academic year, the sun is finally shining and summer may actually have arrived as temperatures are set to soar. I think of the last year, again riddled by COVID, and wish all of our Braunston School family a safe, healthy and happy break.

Jetty Field

July's Saturday morning work party was brought forward a week to coincide with the Open Gardens to be held the following day. Unfortunately, heavy rain curtailed our efforts, and we were unable to get as much work done as was hoped. We did manage to complete the installation of the pool liner which now extends well into the Nature Reserve. We also made a start on moving the garden compost heap into the wild area and the allotment compost bins.



Not on the agenda though was the rescue of a grass snake which had been caught up in some garden netting in the allotments. Thanks to the intrepid efforts of Bob Tuck and Mike Gunn, the reptile was cut free and released. It slithered back into the undergrowth without a word of thanks.

Due to the cold and wet weather we have experienced earlier this year we have seen very few butterflies so far this summer. The allotmenteers are happy not to see the Cabbage Whites as their caterpillars can do considerable damage to brassicas in a very short

space of time. Other species are missed though as they are very welcome pollinators.

On a similar note, pigeons and crow numbers appear to have dropped


in the last few weeks. Perhaps this is due to our resident peregrine falcons.

Once again the children of the Year 6 class at Braunston School learnt about the village's pocket park. In July they submitted a range of competition entries using various techniques in the competition for the Gallie Cup.

Imogen's winning entry included information about trees, bees, wildflowers and birds as well as the feather and leaves she had collected from Jetty Field and identified.

Of particular note were the entries from Amelia-Grace who made an accurate 3D map, Finn whose large art poster showed all aspects of Jetty Field and made the link between the pollinating insects and the food growing in the allotments and William who made a booklet and a sloping model to show the landscape at Jetty Field.

Braunston CAN (Climate Action Network)

Our Air Quality Egg has arrived. It is an air quality monitor: we are calling it the Braunston Egg. It monitors the quality of the air by

recording the amount of carbon dioxide, sulphur dioxide and particulate matter, the harmful particles given off by burning.

You can see the data by looking on the web portal at

https://airqualityegg.wickeddevice.com/portal/

This shows a map of all the 'Eggs'

around the world with the Air Quality Index for each location based on the US Environmental Protection Agency scale. It is a global citizen science project.

For our project we plan to contact local schools and offer to demonstrate the use of the Egg. We will link with other groups in West Northamptonshire who are measuring air quality with other devices in order to share data. We also hope to work with West Northamptonshire Council. At present we are using it in the village to gain confidence in its use and data download.

The Braunston Egg has been financed by a grant that was awarded to us by Daventry District Council in the previous financial year.

We are a group of about twenty Braunston residents working to reduce the carbon emissions of the village and beyond.

Braunston Paddox Cricket Club

The cricket club have continued with their curates egg of a season. Some excellent victories, a few nail-biting defeats and too many batting collapses.

The firsts beat Wollaston by 20 runs and Hardingstone by 5 wickets when Jordan Shingler returned his best ever figures of 6 for 17, but then lost on the last ball of the game by 3 runs to Abington despite half centuries by Shingler and James Goodwin, for which he was awarded his Honours cap. Unfortunately, our game against MK Air, who have not won a match all season, was abandoned due to the weather, almost certainly costing us the win points. This was even more disappointing in that it was the only game rained off across the whole of the Northamptonshire League's 110 matches that day.

The seconds have had similar results. 4 wicket losses to Haddon and Stewarts & Lloyds and a frustrating 1 wicket loss to Weldon, which went down to the last few balls. This was followed by the team's best result of the season. Playing away to league leaders Pytchley, we were not expected to win but following some excellent bowling by Kieran Bennett (2 for 35) and Tom Sabin (3 for 32) we restricted our hosts to 174. A record-breaking opening partnership of 137 between Bennett and Simon Stapley set us up for a comfortable victory. Although there were a few jitters as we approached the finishing line winning by 5 wickets with 3 overs to spare. Bennett's 84 was his highest ever score and it included 12 boundaries.

The Wednesday team have held on to third place in Division 2 of the Rugby and District League with wins against Long Itchington and Haddon and a loss to Dunchurch, despite a magnificent career best 81 runs by Adam Treen.



Staverton Shuffle Saturday 17/7/21

In full sunshine and on what proved to be the hottest day of the year, eleven of us set off through Jetty Fields and down Nibbits Lane to reach the canal. We strolled along the canal and then over to St Peter's Church at Wolfhamcote. Turning left behind the church you go under the old railway to a field resplendent with blue linseed flowers.

Off the main path we crossed a concrete bridge over the River Leam and tracked the river, walking through overgrown grass along field edges to reach the Berryfields track and on to the Miry Bridge. A welcome spot of shade. Philip told us about the origin of the word Miry and how it was true to its name, a border between Warwickshire and Northamptonshire as well as the boundary between three parishes. It was good to have him and his knowledge back.

We left the shade and took a diagonal path through crops to Staverton bridleway. From here it is a steep and exhausting climb all the way to Staverton, but the views over the Warwickshire Plain are superb, particularly on a fine day. We passed through the old stone village to the Countryman. The drinks and food went down well. It was nice to sit down and gently cool off. We were all too soon off again, walking alongside Staverton Hall, through a gate and onto the path which drops steeply down the hill we had struggled up. On the recce I had been lucky enough to see deer in the fields, but not today. Following waymarked tracks, you eventually reach the back of Berryfields Farm.

From here it is a rollercoaster over rough fields, keeping the distant church spire in sight. You do get one of the best views of the village though. We paused several times in shady spots and finally reached Old Road. Like a malignant sting in the tale we had to climb Nibbits Hill. Someone suggested a drink at the Plough. There was no discussion, and we were soon sitting outside in the sun enjoying a post walk tipple.

Braunston Canal Society

Over the last few months the signage along the canal network has been cataloged and reviewed by volunteers working in conjunction with CRT. June saw the start of BCS removing damaged or obsolete signs and replacing them with new ones reflecting current regulations and branding. This project is to be completed over the next few months.

This year's lock painting schedule was completed in record time. The painting of Locks 4,5 and 6 by the end of June has cleared the way for BCS to focus on other projects



such as lock maintenance and towpath issues

Braunston FC win the divisional cup to secure a league and cup double!

Shortly after finally securing the league title back in May our attention quickly switched to trying to win the divisional cup. After winning all 4 group stage games whilst scoring 20 goals and conceding only 4 we moved on to the two-legged semi-finals where we would play Caldecott Arms. We knew this would be a tough couple of games as they were the only team to have beaten us this season. The first leg was a very tight game which saw us score an all-important third goal late on to give us a 3-1 lead heading into the 2nd leg. The away fixture however saw us put in our best performance of the season and we comfortably won the game 5-0 (8-1 on aggregate).

This result set up a final against the Jolly Abbott, who put in an excellent performance in the first half of the final but found themselves 1-0 down after Braunston's centre forward Lloyd Monger scored against the run of play. A second goal shortly followed when the top goal scorer in the Rugby & District League, Lewis Isom volleyed in his 24th goal of the season. Jolly Abbott did pull a goal back to reduce the deficit to 2-1 but were unable to breakdown a solid Braunston defence in the second half and the game finished 2-1, meaning the league and cup double was complete and all that was left was for Braunston villager and club captain Mark Dyson to lift the trophy and start the celebrations!

As has often been the case this season the team went back to The Old Plough to celebrate another hard-earned victory. Once the trophies have been engraved, they will be on display in the pub for all to see.

Thanks to everyone who has been down to the playing field supporting the lads this season, it really has been one to remember. We will be back in August for preseason training to help us get ready to tackle division 1 next season.

Your Café

The Braunston Community Café (Your Café) first opened its doors in December 2014 with a Manager, David Maltby and a



management team consisting of Chris Maltby and Andrew & Ingrid Alsop. A group of volunteers were assembled and at its peak there were more than 25 people involved; sadly, this is no longer the case. The amount of time, hard work and dedication given to operating Your Café by management and volunteers cannot be overstated. The ongoing support and encouragement of Isabel and Louis Prat as landlords has been tremendous.

For more than 5 years, until closure due to Covid19 on 13th March 2020, Your Café operated successfully. Regrettably, the manager David Maltby and management team of Chris Maltby and Jenni Burton stepped down officially from their roles last year. David caried out this role voluntarily as did Chris and Jenni and we are extremely grateful to them.

In the 5 years of trading, Your Cafe has raised significant money for grant funding; to date a total of £18,475 has been donated across 25 different village groups and projects representing 47 successful applications. There are currently grant funds available of at least £10,500 that can be distributed over the coming years under the existing application process. This is a great legacy.

Without a volunteer café manager, Your Cafe cannot legally be re-opened and regrettably despite having made this clear in the BVN and correspondence to individuals over the last six months no one has agreed to take on this role.

Despite the closure of the Café on 13th March, there have been some fixed costs that have had to be paid and would need to still be paid whilst no income was coming in, thus depleting the grant funds.

Sadly, given this situation the Steering Group have needed to make a decision. It is that Your Café will close permanently. We do understand that this is a disappointment.

We remain open for applications to the fund for village organisations and projects.

Weather report for June

It was a month of two halves, with some lovely summer warmth at the beginning of the month, it then changed mid-month to become cooler with rain. We even had to put the heating on in the evenings, it felt more like autumn on the longest day of the year.

The temperature ranged from 5°C at 04.27 on the 23rd, with an above average 27°C at 18.07 on the 13th.

The barometer reached a high of 1028.5hpa on the 13th at 07.27 with a low of 1008.7hpa on the 17th at 02.20.

The last of the rain was on the 29th with a total of 36.9mm for the month. This is less than the village June 6 year average of 50.5mm. Averages are wonderful as we only had 1mm in 2018 and 109mm in 2019. Total rainfall so far this year is now 303.9mm

It was a relatively calm month with a single gust of wind 18.3mph at 18.27 on 18th.

The sun was at its brightest on the 26th with 1155w/m² at 12.20. The UV index was at its highest at a level of 11.

Feature

Meeting the local plants: Tilia Species

Otherwise known as the lime or linden tree (no, not that sort of lime!). The Malvaceae family.

Turn into Jetty Field and we see these beautiful trees. Traditionally known as the tree of judgement and soothsaying, the soothsayer would wrap the leaves around her fingers and listen to what the tree told her.

Planted in the centre of towns and used as a meeting place for the authorities, the tree represented the community. A

tree of good luck and fortune.

The leaves and flowers are edible. The sap can be tapped like birch. Leaves can be dried and crushed and used as a thickener (used for vegans), or ground and used as flour. Use like vine leaves after blanching first. Enjoy tea using the flowers, either fresh or dried. They smell heavenly! Make into cordials. For some recipes look at the Eatweeds website for links.

Medicinally, the flowers and leaves are used. Pick the flowers in sunshine and when just opened. Use newer leaves too (or on their own

if you have missed the flowers). An easy way to use them is as a tea. Leave to infuse about 15 minutes and drink regularly. A cardiotonic, Tilia helps with high blood pressure and to prevent arteriosclerosis. A mild diuretic. Think how this plant makes you feel when you smell the flowers - that is how it will make you feel, it will help to lift and relax your mood, help calm the nerves. There are so many other uses, even externally as a poultice,



but let's finish with Maurice Messegue's words as he describes Tilia as being one of the ingredients in his tea of happiness. 'peaceful nights, joyful awakenings and happy days'.




