Church letter

"Why is communal singing so compelling? We could ask ... the songbirds, some of whom are known by their special, collective singing names: an 'exaltation' of skylarks ... a 'clattering' of jackdaws, a 'gaggle' of geese of a 'screech' of gulls"

This quote is from a book called Why We Sing, by Julia Hollander, a singing therapist, among other things. She goes on to talk about how birds, such as starlings, look for opportunities to sing together, as well as singing separately. Their brains release different chemicals, and they even change how they sing to blend with each other. Maybe the term 'birdbrain' shouldn't be an insult after all!

Singing together is really good for us humans too. You may remember me mentioning this before. We now have a date for starting our "Singing For Wellbeing" sessions; a simple, old-fashioned singalong. These will be at All Saints' Church, Braunston, every first Saturday of the month at 3pm, beginning on the 7th October.

Like our bird friends, we all have different voices – some of us may feel that we'd fit in better with a 'screech' of gulls or a 'gaggle' of geese than an 'exaltation' of skylarks. Again, some of us might have had really mean choir teachers at school who made us feel ashamed of our singing. They were wrong! Just think how glorious it is to hear the gulls screeching when you get to the seaside. Just like the birds, all our voices have a place, and using them is good for us – as individuals and as a community.

This is not a choir, not a rehearsal, not a performance, not religious (though the odd favourite hymn from school assemblies or rugby stands might make an appearance). You're welcome to bring your favourite song. We'll muddle along, blow the cobwebs out, and go home feeling better than we came in.


Friends of All Saints'

Parish Councillor Graham Newman

I came to the village in 2005 with my wife, Tina, to moor our narrowboat in Braunston Marina. I am now the General Manager of the Marina.

Having decided to move to the Midlands we explored all the surrounding villages but decided to buy a house in Braunston as it has so much to offer by way of shops, a post office, school, and pre- school along with 4 Public Houses and a wonderful friendly community.



I was part of the steering group that wrote the Neighbourhood Plan that sets out our vision for a more sustainable community and the plan is from 2011 to 2029. My involvement in this project led to me becoming a Parish Councillor in 2014. My aim as a Parish Councillor is to ensure that any development adheres to the plan and its policies.

Part of our vision is to provide more affordable housing in the village that can be occupied by villagers and to this end the Parish Council has supported a design and subsequent application by Northants Rural Housing Association for a further 21 homes comprising 1,2,3 & 4 bed houses and bungalows.

From 1989 to 2012 my work was in the property industry selling and renting homes. I have gained considerable experience in this field dealing with serious rental issues for both landlords and tenants and would be able to advise and help anyone who encounters issue in this field. The laws for rental properties are changing and everyone needs to know their rights and obligations. Feel free to email me if you need help at graham.newman@braunstonpc.org

I like to get involved as a volunteer in many things and currently assist the Canal & River Trust, Rugby Rokeby Lions and more recently Jetty Fields here in our village.

I am responsible for looking after The Green as a councillor and have just had agreement to replace the broken bench by the bus stop on The Green along with repairs to the bus shelter supports and replacement of some of the rotted and missing posts around The Green.

Kindness and Compassion

A Cut Through Time - a whistle-stop tour of Braunston in the 1920s

The village hall in mid-October will be filled with cast and crew of the Braunston Community Production bringing you a world premiere devised and written in the village, from the history of Braunston.



We have the called the show A Cut Through Time because it is about a specific period in Braunston's history, and a play on words - boaters refer to the canal as the cut, and the canal cuts through Braunston. The canal is part of the history of Braunston along with the school, the village hall, all the pubs (present and past), the High Street, memories of the glue factory and the church.

A Cut Through Time is based on real people and events in Braunston in the 1920s. A period of new inventions, fun and frolics, and increasing liberation for women. But there were strikes, the aftermath of a flu pandemic, rising prices and scary household bills. Sound familiar?

Lots of Braunston people have helped make this show. Writers who came to our early summer workshops, children at the school who brought the story of the boatmen's strike to life in their summer show The Day the Boats Stopped and local residents who are on The Bugle (the village Facebook site) and happy to answer questions about what Braunston means to them. We interviewed people in their front rooms who could remember the old village school and met older residents in The Wheatsheaf who were happy to share stories about skating on the canal and gathering coal in a pram. As one of them said over a pint of best:

"There's an awful lot of history in Braunston".

There are other pubs available in Braunston of course and one of the scenes in A Cut Through Time ends with a song celebrating the pubs that have been and gone, as well as the four still serving. There were 26 pubs in Braunston once, for the farm hands, station staff, post master

and mistress, local bobbies, vicars, butchers and bakers but not the Baptist and Methodist ministers of course! All of these folk are listed on the 1921 Census which has just been released into the public domain and is a fantastic source of everybody who was in Braunston in April 1921. Just over 1,000 people were resident, and it also recorded the boating families who were at the wharf on their way through to Birmingham or Brentford, Limehouse or Leicester.

We have used newspapers of the time to find local goings on and events nationally to provide some context for the story. Then taking real people who lived and worked in Braunston in the 1920s, like the Nursers and the Rushalls, we have woven all these stories together to create our show - an hour long play with songs performed by local actors and musicians.

We are very grateful for the financial support of Braunston Parish Council and the help of the Village Hall Committee and the Pre-School who have helped us create a theatre from scratch in the hall. The proceeds of the raffle will go to the Pre-School and other local causes.

A Cut Through Time will be performed Thursday to Saturday 12th to the 14th October at 7.30pm in the village hall. It is part of a double bill with our new touring show Rats, Ropes and Revolutions. Tickets are on sale now on Eventbrite and cost £13 (£10 concessions) for which you get a whole evening's entertainment, a raffle and refreshments for sale. All on your doorstep.

August saw a crew of 7 doing their best to paint lock 6. The poor condition of the wood on this lock along with interruptions by the heavy boat traffic made completing the task near impossible in the time available. The contribution from our latest volunteer, Derek





Price, along with Sam and Mike from Galliford Try helped make it a success.

A crew of 9, which included 4 volunteers from Galliford Try, graded the towpath below lock 4. Stone, transported to the site, was added to create a slope that would shed surface water into the canal.





The damaged brick coping below lock 4 was repaired.

All the lock gates were scraped to remove vegetation. The grounds at Midland Chandlers and the junction waterpoint were maintained.

BCS also supported three ex forces chaps who were kayaking from Manchester to London along the canals to raise money to fund a memorial at the National Memorial Arboretum. It will remember their colleagues who were lost to suicide after they had finished their



service. Due to safety rules they required BCS, using workboat 'Skippy2Sheds', to transport them up the flight and through the tunnel.

Braunston Walkers

Cromer Weekend

Friday 1/9/23

For this year's weekend away we were off to Cromer, a lovely old fashioned, full on, bucket and spade, seaside resort complete with a pier. Fantastic! The surrounding area is hilly, most unusual for Norfolk which is generally pretty flat.

We stayed at the Cliftonville Hotel on the sea front with splendid views of the old pier. It's just like stepping back to the 50s and the era of Helen Shapiro singing 'Walking Back to Happiness' on the transistor radio.

It's a long drive to Cromer so it was good to walk a 5 mile romp over the cliffs to Overstrand along narrow paths on cliff tops next to a golf course with the blue sea below crumbling cliffs. We strolled through the town past the church which has a family of peregrine falcons then to a park wherewith a statue of Henry Blogg, Britain's most decorated lifeboatman, credited with saving 873 lives. To bring luck people are encouraged to rub his nose which shines from all the attention.

We continued climbing up the cliffs passing the lighthouse to Overstrand where we went to the Clifftop Cafe for well earned refreshment or in Peter's case a full English breakfast! Our path back took in the village and its fantastic flint church then across the golf course and back up onto the cliff top, with the sea sparkling in the sunshine below.

Saturday 2/9/23

After far too much breakfast Phil Kirk organised a 5 mile walk to Sheringham and then 3 miles to Weybourne and the bus back. We set off from the hotel along cliff tops and then down to the beach where the tide was going out. We walked along the beautiful beach avoiding the waves. The sun shone and we continued on the beach before climbing up past a model of a mammoth, a fossil of which some walkers had found in the cliffs.

The next climb took us to the top of the Beeston Bump with superb views back to Cromer and on over Sheringham. It's 63 metres above sea level and really stands out. Whoever said Norfolk was flat? Nigel and Judith supplied us with sweets for energy before we dropped downhill all the way into the busy resort of Sheringham for a spot of lunch. We were treated to views of steam trains on the North Norfolk heritage line as we met up at the station ready for the afternoon walk to Weybourne.

There are some coastguard cottages in the distance as we walked over cliff tops that never seemed to get any closer! Once we finally reached them we climbed Water Hill, just a bump really, before descending to Weybourne. The sea here is called Weybourne Hope and there is a rhyme saying 'he who would old England win must at Weybourne Hope begin'. It is now where the cables are buried from the wind farm, far out to sea, taking the energy to the National Grid. Strolling up Beach Lane we dropped into the Ship Inn, out of the sun, to wait for the bus back to Cromer. Most of us qualify for bus passes but the fare is only £2 anyway. What a bargain!

Dinner was served earlier as we had booked for the Summer Show at the theatre at the end of the pier. With the sun setting up the coast we strolled along the old pier to the show. A great variety show and very enjoyable.

Sunday 3/9/23

On the way home near Swaffham is the small hamlet of West Acre and the Stag pub which was our starting point for a 5 mile circuit along the River Nar, a crystal clear, chalk stream. It has the same geology as we had encountered on our weekend at New Alresford in Hampshire so the scenery was superb. The first part is in the forest by the river to reach Castle Acre where we walked around the old Priory then a road back to the quirky little pub with local beer from a barrel behind the bar where we were soon enjoying their local handmade pies, just fantastic.

A great weekend, super walks, great entertainment, company, hotel, food and drink.

Braunston Paddox Cricket Club

The Northamptonshire County Cricket League, one of the largest in England, finished its 2023 season on16th September. Braunston celebrated in style with both teams winning. The 1st XI beat Bugbrooke by 5 wickets to gain promotion for next year and the 2nds avenged an earlier defeat by Kettering with a hard fought victory by 3 wickets. The seconds maintained their mid table position and will await the outcome of the proposed league structure to be announced next month.

The firsts ended their season with a run of 6 consecutive victories. Since the last BVN report they have beaten Bugbrooke, MK AIR, Wellingborough Town and Weldon. Although promotion has not yet been ratified by the League their 3rd place in the division should mean that they will be promoted to a higher division next year. This will not be confirmed until after the forthcoming restructuring which is necessary as there has been an influx of clubs applying to join the league from other county leagues, notably Buckinghamshire and Warwickshire.

The seconds have won two out of their last three matches with victories over Kettering and Horton House and a narrow defeat to Abington Phoenix, who will be promoted next year.

Individual highlights in the past month saw Jordan Shingler score his 50th half century for the club. Only two other members have scored more than twenty-five and many only dream of scoring just one. The other record of note is Adam Treen taking the most catches by a club member in a season (23). He also broke the record for the most stumpings in a season with seven.

We are pleased to have received news from Marston's pubs that installation of the chargers at the Boat House should be completed by mid-October.

Walking and cycling

Both West Northamptonshire Council and the Government have policies and targets for increasing walking and cycling with aims such as improving health and reducing carbon emissions and pollution. The Government's ambition is 'to make cycling and walking the natural choices for shorter journeys, or as part of a longer journey by 2040.'

We have been looking at what could be done to make this achievable for people in Braunston. We are focusing on completing the Braunston to Daventry cycling and walking route, the 'barrier effect' of having a fast road, the A45 dividing the parish and the potential to have a cycle route westwards to link to Draycote Water and National Cycle Route 41.

We are planning to work with Braunston Parish Council and West Northamptonshire Council to seek improvements in the parish. We are consulting with Sustrans, the national charity that works with communities, helping them with walking, wheeling and cycling to create healthier places.

Whilst most of us in Braunston live to the north of the A45 there are homes, businesses and rights of way such as the track to Wolfhampcote and the footpath to Staverton on the south side. To reach the Government's target it should be possible to feel safe walking and cycling across the A45. At present it is possible to use the informal towpath accesses to go under the road. How do you cross the A45? Do you feel safe walking or cycling? We would be pleased to receive your views. Feature

Road names

Archer Avenue was probably the first road in Braunston to be named after a person. The minutes of the Parish Council meeting on 25th February 1948 acknowledge a decision of



Daventry Rural District Council to name the 'new road on the housing estate Archer Avenue'. Mr F W Rushall felt this was 'an honour conferred on Mr Archer, an honour richly deserved and well-earned by his public work both as a parish councillor and rural district councillor. He moved that the Parish Council acknowledge and confirm the name. This was seconded by Mr S M Capell and passed unanimously. Mr S Archer thanked Mr Rushall and councillors for their kind remarks.



In January1968 the Parish Council discussed road names for the new housing area that at the time was referred to as the Greenlands Estate. The architects proposed the name Greenway for the road which the council supported, but for the two closes they had their own ideas. The suggestion of Brindley Close was rejected in favour of Mill Close and instead of Oxford Close the council preferred Gould Close. The

Parish Council claimed these names were more appropriate for the village. Mr Gould, pronounced gold, was headmaster of the village school in about 1930. Later Thompson Close appears to be named after Miss D A Thompson one of the longest serving parish councillors in the 20th century.





After his name was rejected for a close off Greenway, the Derbyshire engineer James Brindley who designed many canals was recognised for the new road at the Braunston Marina housing development.
