

Rector's letter

I love singing.

Whether we sing in the shower, in the car, in a choir, on a night out, in church, in the pub, or in the garden, singing is good for us. There's something about singing that is just so wonderfully human. In fact, I don't sing nearly enough. I wonder if you'd like to sing more too.

This Autumn, I'm planning to introduce "Singing for Wellbeing" as a monthly, drop-in get-together. This is not a choir. This is not a church service. This is simply an hour or so, probably on a Seturday afternoon, to come together and sing well known to

a Saturday afternoon, to come together and sing well-known tunes chosen by whoever comes, just for the sake of it. It's always useful to start with a hymn book, but if there are other songs you'd like to bring, we can do that too. So watch this space! We'll start in Braunston church (it's helpful with the plumbing), but if it's popular, it would be lovely to hold it in Welton too.

I've sung all my life; in choirs, as a soloist, as an enthusiastic singer-along-to-the-radio, as well as hymns in and out of church. But right now, I'm not singing enough and I feel the lack of it. One of the reasons that I'm not singing enough, is that I'm completing my MA dissertation this year. Guess what it's about? Singing. Specifically, singing in church.

You can imagine how delighted I was, then, when folk in our churches started talking about bringing back singing some of the prayers we usually say in our services. It's not about sounding like a cathedral choir. It's not about how we sound at all. It's about the joy of being fully human in our worship. We'll start this at our services in Ashby and Welton from September and we'll teach the tune so everyone can join in.

The third way of increasing singing will be a short service of evening prayer on Tuesdays at Ashby Church, where we will sing the Psalm of the day, rather like the nuns in Call The Midwife. This will be every Tuesday at 6pm from September, and will be a wonderful way to stop, slow down, and pray simply in a beautiful place.

So, three extra opportunities for singing more are coming in the autumn. I hope that wherever you are, you can have a good sing from time to time. It's not about how we sound; it's about enjoying it. I meet so many people who say they can't sing, often because of a bad experience with a school choir mistress! It's not true. With the exception of medical issues, everyone can sing. Not everyone sings in tune, but so what? It's still good to sing, and no one will be judging. So look out for details of "Singing for Wellbeing", and come along and have a go.

Welton Road Play Area

Further repairs have been made to the fence. The use of concrete posts will reduce the need for further work.

Planning

The Parish Council supported five planning applications but did not support an application for housing to the rear of the Old Plough as the concerns that led to rejection of the original proposal were not addressed by the revisions.

Bench on The Green

The slats are broken. The bench will be replaced by a new one made from recycled plastic as this costs less and will be more long-lasting.

Parish Council Surgeries

It was agreed that these will be held monthly and will last for 1 hour at varying times so that they are available for a wider range of parishioners.

The next surgery will be held in the Old Library, Braunston Village Hall by Pete Morgan and Graham Newman from 10am to 11am on Tuesday August 8th.

Former Councillor Peter Biggs

Following the announcement of his death, the Parish Council recorded a vote of appreciation for the work Peter did in Braunston not only during his terms as a Councillor but also in Jetty Field and more generally.

Report from WNC Councillor Rosie Humphries

Home to School Transport

WNC received 1460 responses to its recent consultation on this issue. This includes proposals to help simplify the current policy and make it clearer for parents and schools as to the criteria for entitlement to free home to school transport. The last two years has seen an increase in demand and operating costs.

The review of the current policy has identified that WNC provides an enhanced level of provision above and beyond its legal requirements for example, by offering the subsidised concessionary seats scheme to

some pupils who do not meet statutory eligibility criteria for free transport. A new Spare Seat Scheme will mean that parents are no longer guaranteed a seat as these will only be offered where the Council has spare capacity available on its existing contracted services. To mitigate the impact of this change, students who are currently guaranteed transport under the current non-entitled scheme will continue to be guaranteed a seat until they either cease attending the school or after they complete Year 11.

All councils have a legal duty to provide free transport to a child's nearest school with places available when the relevant distance criteria are met, however WNC's current policy provides an enhancement to this and includes free travel assistance to a child's nearest or linked school. 785 responses to the consultation objected to the proposal to remove this assistance to linked schools, particularly as regards the impact on families living in rural areas, which the Equality Impact Assessment also identified. As a result WNC will continue to provide free home to school transport to a child's nearest or "Geographically Associated school" (the new name for Linked Schools) where this is over the statutory walking distance, or where the walking route is deemed unsuitable.

The Future of the BVN

In the June edition of the BVN, I wrote about a group that was being set up to look at how the BVN should carry on after both the current editors have "retired." The group, comprising representatives of the Parish and Parochial Church Councils, the editor and a representative of the proof readers has met and confirmed their commitment to continue to publish 11 editions a year as at present and to retain the current A5 format.

Rather than seek a volunteer to be the editor, it is planned to seek several volunteers to share the task across the year. At present, we have managed to identify editors for more than half the 11 editions. It is proposed to establish an Editorial Board to support the editors and to overview the running of the BVN in the future.

Parish Councillor Pete Morgan

I am not a great fan of social media; this may be an "age thing" and I can see a lot of positives to it, as well as the downsides of thoughtless as well as deliberate postings that cause distress. There were a couple of examples on the Bugle recently that caught my eye: the first was the response of several villagers to a newspaper girl who had dropped her pay packet while delivering the papers – all offered to make good



her loss; the second was the parent who thanked an unknown villager who paid the fare of their daughter when their electronic payment method failed to work on the Daventry bus, bringing a comment from someone else who had been helped in the same way. The support provided by the Village Charity and Braunston Heart, all provided by volunteers, are further evidence of what a caring village Braunston is.

Having lived here for over 40 years, I may just be a little biased, but I think Braunston is a great place to live! Given the above and the number of people who appear to have moved to the village after passing through on the canal, I suspect I may well be correct.

The Parish Council has some statutory duties to fulfil – commenting on planning applications, organising grass cutting, paying for and maintaining street lighting etc – but essentially it exists to enhance the quality of life in the village and is dependent on villagers volunteering to become councillors. At the moment, it is not representative of the village as the average age of councillors is over 50 if not 60! I am well aware of the financial and time pressures on all of us, particularly young families, but if you are able to offer what amounts to a little over one evening a month, do consider becoming a councillor or helping in some other way – the working group for the BVN mentioned elsewhere in this edition for example. Braunston is a great place to live because its residents care for one another and the village.

The only scheduled task party in June welcomed 3 volunteers from National Westminster Bank and 2 from Galliford Try. With 14 willing and able crew, lock 4 was painted in good time along with further efforts to the edging of the brick coping above lock 3.



Six ad hoc task parties this month helped prepare for the annual Historic Boat Rally. Overdue vegetation control, after 'No Mow May', was actioned. This included around

the Stop House, the Gongoozler garden, the towpath from the Stop House to the Junction, the offside at locks 1,2 & 4, the periphery of the junction island and offside at the Stophouse and several bridges.

Another *ad hoc* dealt with a leaning group of hawthorn trees near the marina entrance. Infested with ivy, they finally fell across the towpath after a heavy rain storm. Luckily, BCS had predicted the likelihood of the event and had previously obtained permission and had planned to trim the tree within bird nesting season guidelines. Having positioned

work boat 'Skippy' under the tree the day before it fell, BCS had an ideal platform from which to bring the tree down and clear the towpath obstruction.

Braunston CAN (Climate Action Network)

Pay for Charge Electric Vehicle Charging comes to Braunston

We are awaiting the imminent upgrading of the electricity distribution network in Braunston by our DNO National Grid Electricity Distribution for OspreyEV Charging Network in Partnership with Marstons to install Braunston Village's first Rapid EV Charge Points in the Boat House Car Park this summer.

The charge points will be rapid charging units capable of delivering an 80 mile charge in 30 minutes.

This is part of a partnership to deliver EV charging at Marstons pubs across the country at over 100 sites and the Boat House in Braunston is one of the early installations in this programme.

When installed it is planned to have two tethered rapid chargers and three marked EV charging bays. The chargers will be 50kW DC units capable of charging with CCS and CHAdeMO connectors.

The chargers will accept contactless credit card payment as well as Zap Pay, Osprey App, Electroverse and EV Manufacturer Apps and RFID Cards, similar to those installed in the Bowen Square Car Park in Daventry.

Other pay for charge slow chargers are available at Braunston Marina. These three untethered charging posts can deliver a 3.7kW output to six cars and have a type 2 plug for which an EV driver needs their own charger lead for charging. These units should deliver 12.5 miles per hour and are more suited to using as a top-up charge. Tokens giving a three hour charge are available from the Braunston Marina Shop currently costing £5 for use with these chargers located in the Marina Complex, Brindley Quays.

These commercial chargers could be of interest for family and friends of Braunston residents and those frequenting Braunston businesses, Braunston Marina moorers and trades contractors, as well as those without charging infrastructure at home. A number of Braunston residents have their own EV chargers installed in their driveways and garages typically as fast 7kW chargers capable of delivering a 25 mile charge in one hour.

We will continue to monitor and plan for increased EVs in the village, although at this stage on-street charging with the street lighting provision being away from the kerb poses issues.

In a future edition of the BVN, I will outline the availability of EV chargers in the surrounding towns of Daventry and Rugby.

Meetings and projects

Our next meeting is at 7.30pm on Wednesday 2nd August. We will meet in the Stop House Garden close to the Gongoozler. Further information about other B-CAN projects can be found in the 'Village Info' section of the village website under 'Climate Emergency' and on Facebook at 'Braunston Climate Action Network' (BCAN). This year in early summer, the judge, Lynda Palmer, Clifton -upon-Dunsmore, said, "There are some lovely gardens on display in the village this summer with very interesting ideas, attractive planting schemes and lots of pretty containers and hanging baskets. Many gardens are well maintained despite the unusual weather conditions".

GARDENS TROPHY

1st - 65 High Street. A lovely garden fronting this stone house, it has been designed to fit perfectly into the available space. A spectacular pink rose creates a background for a very attractive collection of plants, structural shrubs, soft landscape and pretty herbaceous planting making optimum use of its shady position.

1st - 19 Brindley Quays. Some very large pretty hanging baskets full of flower form a spectacular display. Well maintained and watered.

2nd - 6 Sanders Close. With a group of containers with tomato plants, an excellent idea and good use of space.

3rd - 26 Eastfields. This garden provides an attractive display of containers planted with petunias and lobelia.

Both Saturday teams have fared well in the past month. The firsts have convincingly won all three games they have played. The highlight being a rare 10 wicket victory over Wellingborough who were dismissed for 102 with skipper Elijah Glover taking 5 wickets for just 18 runs. He followed this up with 74 in an unbroken opening partnership of 108 with Dhillon Chokshi. Visitors Long Buckby and then Geddington also failed to stretch

the in-form team who now sit third in their tightly contested division.



The seconds also played well without quite the success of their senior side. A very comfortable win over Heyford, who were bowled out for just 44, with Shaun Harnett taking 4 for 23 and Colin Scott 3 for 7 was followed by their closest match of the season away at Wellingborough Old Grammarians. OGs were the only unbeaten side in the division and were on top from the very first ball. They held the upper hand until well into our innings when a spirited 8th wicket stand between Shaun Harnett (51) and Rakesh Patel (33) brought us back into the game. Support in the last few overs from Alex Goddard meant that we posted a very creditable 147. The BPCC bowlers stuck to their task, aided by some excellent catches by Dom Goddard and Noah Kemp left OGs needing to score 4 runs off the last over. This they managed

Canon's Ashby

Helen Cable of the National Trust has provided the information for our feature article this month.

Preparation is slowly turning to think about Christmas (dare we say it)! Until then, the Museum Room in the house has been transformed into a small display about one of Canons Ashby's most famous residents, Louis Osman. It's well worth a look.

Louis Osman lived at Canons Ashby as a tenant of the Dryden family in the 1960s and 1970s. He was a talented silversmith and was commissioned to make the coronet for King Charles III when he was invested as Prince of Wales in 1969 - an important commission to be given. It was made from 24 carat gold using the innovative technology of electroforming, which made it much lighter than a traditional crown.

Osman had already transformed large parts of the house into workshops, and about 30 people worked with him, so the place would have been quite a hive of activity. Gold leaf was often used and one part of the house was set aside for this very important and delicate work with the bath in the room next door regularly filled with cyanide used in gold plating!

The house offered a fantastic setting to display all his other works in gold and silver, as well as his wife Dilys's enamels, and Osman even housed an exhibition in the Long Gallery to showcase his work and raise money for the restoration of the house. One of the most famous guests who visited to see and purchase his work was the film star Elizabeth Taylor.

Today as part of the display, you can see one of Osman's original sketches for the coronet as well as silver plates he created for himself. There's also more information about his time at Canons Ashby and you can compare the weights of the coronet King Charles wore at his investiture as Prince of Wales and the crown he wore at his coronation – which would you rather wear?

The photo shows the door to Osman's silver safe with its original lock, (although not in its original location or currently on display).
