#### **Church Letter**

#### I don't like cricket – I love it

What a summer of sport we are having. Wimbledon has served up some great entertainment. At the time of writing, the 150<sup>th</sup> Open golf championship is in full swing; the UEFA Women's Championship has kicked off well for the Lionesses; the Commonwealth Games are about to be out of the blocks in Birmingham; and I am looking forward to a trip to Lord's to catch some cricket. Forgive the puns!

Anyone who has played sport with any degree of seriousness will know what it takes to be successful. It takes dedication, hours of practice, motivation, mental and physical toughness, focus, discipline and perseverance not to mention a whole lot of support from family, schools, clubs, coaches and others. If all goes well, if you manage to stay free from injury, and sometimes with a good dollop of luck to boot, you will win something. There will be trophies and medals to show for it.

The Bible is not short of a sporting metaphor. In the New Testament, St. Paul referenced sport quite a bit in his letters to the early churches in Turkey, Greece and Rome. Not surprising considering the popularity of sporting events in those places at the time. Paul emphasises that the Christian life is a long-distance race, rather than a short sprint. Christians need to run the race well and with perseverance, keeping our eyes fixed on the 'prize', which is Jesus, heaven, and eternity. We need commitment to run a straight race, and not to run aimlessly. We need to target our efforts, not wasting energy on throwing punches at thin air. We need to be disciplined and act with integrity so as not to lose our 'crown' by failing to compete according to the rules. We need to fight well and finish the race.



Succeeding in sport, in life, in faith is all about building good habits, constantly making small changes to achieve better results, and surrounding ourselves with people who will help and encourage us. The team meet each Saturday morning at 10:00 am at the cemetery.



# **Braunston C of E School**



Today, I found myself looking at the weather and the predictions shown for Braunston that the temperature could reach the heights of between 40 and 42 degrees. Despite these unprecedented times, teaching and learning was still going on in every classroom. Children

and staff managed their day surrounded by fans and constant access to water bottles to keep hydrated. FOBs were kind enough to supply ice lollies too. Due to the peak of temperature spiking at 3pm on Tuesday 20<sup>th</sup> July, parents were offered the opportunity to pick up their children slightly earlier if they were able to. This was well received and our children and staff remained safe and well.

Our school fair once again was opened on the school playground with a dance presented by each class. The focus this year was on the values of the Commonwealth Games. We saw an amazing array of performances and a packed playground full of smiling children, staff, parents, carers and other relatives, happy to be back together again. What a wonderful day! We held the school fair on a Tuesday afternoon and this meant that every child was present – unlike a Saturday where sometimes families have other commitments. Each class ran a stall to raise funds and we were well supported – plus the weather stayed dry!

Our Year 6 children were super ambassadors for Braunston School as they rose to dizzy heights of success! This happened literally whilst on their residential where they took to the high ropes, one part of their activity programme. Water activities were also key and raft building (and sinking!) was another popular choice. The children demonstrated their values throughout their stay and the centre staff commented on Braunston's positive behaviours. We know that they will continue to be amazing ambassadors and we look forward to hearing about all they achieve in their futures.

Transitions into secondary schools have now taken place and those children heading into the next stage of their learning journey in Northamptonshire schools have enjoyed a four day extended transition with their last day at Braunston on Friday 15<sup>th</sup> July. Meanwhile, at school, all children spent three days with their new teachers. This means that in September the children will have already started to build the positive relationship with their new staff team and are then ready for the

exciting learning challenges ahead.

As the academic year draws to a close, I have reflected on previous months and thought about what we have achieved and how far we have come. School life has a new normality and Covid is now 'just' part of that. Teaching and learning has continued with the children experiencing an exciting curriculum that enthuses and inspires them. We have restarted key school events such as the summer fair and welcomed our community back fully into school. Our sports day was a great success and our school family shared those successes with us. We have just also heard that we have been awarded the Sportsmark Gold Award – a great honour celebrating our sporting activities that we run and participate in.

Thank you all for being part of our Braunston family. I also want to thank all the children and all the staff without whom, Braunston would not be the school it is. I wish you all a restful and relaxing break and we look forward to welcoming you back in September.

#### **Braunston CAN (Climate Action Network)**

The Braunston Tree Trail, a short walk around Braunston compiled by Helen and Alan Morgan, is ready. The trail guide helps identify trees as you go along the trail. Recycling helps reduce emissions as making things from recycled materials uses less energy than making them from raw materials. #### **Braunston Canal Society**

Another outing for Skippy allowed a crew of six to cut some errant vegetation. Embarking at the Stop House and working our way along to the junction,



some over vigorous summer growth was removed from the towpath as well as the offside. The underneath of the central arch of the junction bridges was strimmed along with the periphery of the island. The arisings being deposited at the junction water point. Surprisingly, the diversity of wild flowers on the island (see photo) is already starting to improve hence our revised vegetation control strategy. Understandably, the island is an ideal duck nesting site. Something else BCS have to consider when trying to maintain good visibility across the island for boaters . The offside margins were also strimmed opposite the Stop



House and Marina. The arisings being deposited at our composting site at Union Canal Carriers.

Continuing preparations for the Historic Boat Rally at the end of June a start was made on rebuilding the BIFA bin compound at the Stop House. With all the posts rotted at the base it had seen better days and could potentially collapse. As it is a large project BCS decided to do the work in stages over the next couple of months.

#### **Braunston Walkers**

With the temperature soaring and unbroken sunshine, nine of us drove to the beautiful village of Chipping Warden and parked by its magnificent church (funded by the wool trade). Passing some attractive cottages and dropping downhill we



followed a field path with views to Edgecote House. This area is used to rear racehorses and we needed to cross several gallops with caution. Climbing Edgecote Hill a battlefield site from 1469 and passing by Danes Moor we made the most of any shade from the trees, but had to cross several fields in full sun. Crossing the disused Woodford Halse to Banbury Railway we climbed up to Hill Farm and then crossed a wheat field to reach the lovely old 14<sup>th</sup> century church at Thorpe Mandeville, sadly it was closed.

Passing through the hamlet of Lower Thorpe, which the House of Lords has said will be virtually destroyed due to the building of a viaduct to carry HS2, we went on through Culworth Grounds to the village of Culworth. The track we took emerged right next to the Red Lion pub our lunch stop, which we all rated highly. Outside in The Barn they sell homemade artisan bread, cakes, and delicious ice cream. Four of the group opted to finish here but five set off over field paths and along the road, crossing yet another bit of HS2 construction before reaching Culworth Mill on the River Cherwell. From here back via Edgecote House (used by the BBC in the adaptation of Jane Austen's Pride and Prejudice) through the estate back to Chipping Warden.

Our next walk is 20/8/22 and will be local.





#### **Jetty Field**

Flora and fauna have been thriving in the field in recent weeks. cranesbill, knapweed and birdsfoot trefoil are all more noticeable this year. There has also been a good show of buttercups, clover and

thistles. In particular, we have seen an increase in goatsbeard (see photo) with its yellow dandelion like flower and large seed head. Common across Europe it can be used as a vegetable and was cultivated in France and Italy in the 16<sup>th</sup> century. It has also been used for medicinal purposes, particularly for liver complaints.



Just recently various butterflies and moths have also been spotted. There have been lots of meadow browns, burnett moths, skippers and several marbled whites which have not been seen before. It is also possible that there have been some sightings of wood white butterflies.

Other fauna include grasshoppers and early bumblebees with their yellow shoulder stripe and orange backside.

#### **Gallie Competition**

It was good news that this year's Gallie Competition could resume in person after two years of an on-line event. Class 6 from Braunston School visited Jetty Field in June along with Mrs Marenghi-Smith, Mrs Pateman and Mrs Waghorn. The children visited all parts of Jetty Field and learnt about the different environments it offers. They then carried out investigations into the landscape and history of the location as well as identifying species of trees.



# The Via Beata and The Wolfhamcote Waystation

The Via Beata (A Way of Blessing) is a pilgrims sculpture trail from Lowestoft, the most easterly point of the UK, to St David's just up the road from the most westerly point of Wales a distance of approximately 400 miles.




Along the route waystations are planned. On the 26<sup>th</sup> July the 23<sup>rd</sup> waystation was installed and blessed at Wolfhamcote Church. The relief carving features words from the 23<sup>rd</sup> Psalm.

The words of the psalm were originally written by David, who became King of Israel in about 1011BC. As a young man he tended his father's sheep leading them to find water and protecting them from harm. In this psalm David compares his own relationship with God to that of a sheep with a shepherd.

The church was full for the celebration and blessing, it was a joyous service with singing led by Gospel singers from The New Testament Church of God. Everyone sang loudly, and enthusiastically enough to raise the roof.

# From the Complete Collection of VILLAGE NOTES Published in the Braunston Village News

#### January 1994

In the days before local and central government provided social services it was the custom for successful men to leave land or money in their wills for charitable causes. These might include the support of orphans and the destitute and the maintenance of roads and public buildings especially churches. Such bequests are recorded in Braunston from the16<sup>th</sup> century onwards but the most notable was the will of William Makepeace dated 2nd May 1733.

He left a quarter of a yardland, about eight acres, to provide an income "for putting to school so many poor children, boys and girls, born in the parish of Braunston to learn to read and write, or at least to read and be instructed in the church catechism". If a suitable schoolmaster or mistress or sufficient scholars could not be found, the money was to be used to help those poor who were not in receipt of relief from the rates. When the village land was enclosed, the allotment received by the Makepeace charity was let and rent used to pay the schoolmaster.

When the National School was built on the village green 1820 - 5 this rent was added to the subscription fund raised to finance the school "at which about 100 boys and 50 girls are instructed in reading, writing.


