Most areas in the parish are classified as Amenity Grass or Wildlife Rich Grassland.

Amenity Grass areas include The Green and verges in residential areas. They are mown approximately every three weeks. The machine used does not allow for the arisings to be collected. The interval allows for some beneficial low growing plants such as white clover, creeping buttercup and bird's-foot trefoil to flower between cuts.

Wildlife Rich Grassland includes the verge on the south side of the Butlin's Hill section of High Street and much of the main field at Jetty Field. These areas are mown twice a year to support greater biodiversity. The arisings are collected so that gradually the soil will become more favourable to flowering plants such as ox-eye daisies and campion. At Butlin's Hill the road fringe is mown approximately every three weeks. The council is also arranging for the rear section of this verge to be mown at the same interval.

The paths in Jetty Field are also mown every three weeks.

Parish Councillor Jo Glover

Additional sporting activities are also being run. A current favourite for our year 6 children is Bikeability and you may have seen members of the class cycling around the village during their sessions.

We are looking to the future and know that we have to say goodbye to our current year 6 children. We wish them every good luck in the next step of their journey. As part of their transition work, Year 6 took part in a prayer space workshop where they took the chance to reflect on their time at Braunston School and look forward to their hopes and challenges as they move forward. They will always be part of our Braunston family and we look forward to hearing about their achievements in their new schools. We know that they will do well as they have clearly embedded Braunston School values which will support them to live life in all its fullness.

We have also seen children for our newest Reception intake start to

come into school for stay and play sessions. These have proved very popular in allowing the children to see what their new learning environment is like and for them to meet the staff that will become their constant school adult from September.

Some of you may have noticed our latest addition — a new, accessible outdoor learning space on the KS1 playground. We must give a huge thank you to Cummins who supplied us not only with this amazing structure but also with a fantastic team who gave up their time to clear the site, lay the base and build this structure. This will give our children an additional outdoor learning space that provides protection from the elements and will make a big impact. The children were very excited to see it when they returned after the half term break.

I hope that you are all enjoying the wonderful weather that we are currently experiencing and finding time to reflect on the positives around you. I want to thank you all for being part of our Braunston family. Without your continued support, the children would not have the experiences that they currently enjoy. 

After lunch at the Red Lion our way back took us past the lake that is the source of the River Leam, which flows west into the Bristol Channel, over the Charwelton Tunnel now used to test Formula 1 cars and between the peaks of Arbury Hill at 252 metres above sea level, the source of the River Nene which flows east into The Wash, and Sharmans Hill at 251 metres above sea level.



Cubs Return to a 'WOW' Camp



The Canal & River Trust

wishes to update the local community on plans to replace Bridge 1A, known as the Ladder Bridge, at Braunston.

The charity has been left a generous legacy of £164,400 towards improvements to the canal in the Braunston area, with the legator expressing a preference to spend on the replacement of the 'ladder' bridge, which carries the Grand Union Canal towpath over an entrance to Braunston Marina.

The bridge is a vital piece of infrastructure for the local walking network and currently presents a barrier for some. With stepped access and a narrow deck, it's not currently suitable for people with pushchairs or those in wheelchairs and the aim is to replace the bridge with one that's wider and has access ramps.

Initial concept designs for a replacement bridge indicated a cost substantially more than the value of the legacy – with an estimated shortfall of approximately £150,000. The Trust is currently investing in detailed designs, including extensive ground investigations, to get a more accurate estimate for a replacement bridge.

These ground investigations are due to take place in early July and the Trust expects to have accurate estimates for a replacement bridge by the end of August.

Once the Trust has an up-to-date, accurate cost estimate it will assess the external funding opportunities to appraise the viability of the project.

The Trust has provided the executors of the Will, as well as the Parish Council and other stakeholders, with an update on the project and will keep the local community informed as plans progress over the summer.

Frosty's Nature Notes: Toad in the hole

One of the nicest visitors to our gardens is the common toad (bufo bufo). It is a truly organic and sustainable controller of slugs. Toads are easy to tell from frogs, they have a dry warty skin and crawl rather than spring from place to place. England's toad population has crashed by more than two-thirds in the last three decades. Frogs numbers have dropped by 17 per cent over the same period. The causes are many and varied but loss of small ponds in gardens is certainly a very important one. Have you thought of building a small pond in your garden? I have a small galvanized wash tub pond that attracts frogs.

The common frog (rana temporaria) lays its eggs or spawn by March here in Braunston. Frog's eggs are laid in a mass of jelly and eggs called spawn. Many of those eggs are eaten by fish, amphibians and even birds. Because there are so many there are still plenty to turn into tadpoles which are also popular food for all those pond predators. Only a few tadpoles make it to become froglets and scramble on to dry land where they become food for even more predators including the grass snake. Amazingly enough of that one or two thousand frog eggs a few make it to adulthood. It takes about three years for frogs to reach breeding age and start the whole exciting life and death cycle all over again.




