OUR NEW PARISH COUNCIL Returned unopposed

When nominations for Braunston Parish Council closed there were just 13 names for the 12 seats. We would have to have an election to decide which of the 13 would not be a Councillor. On hearing this, one nominee, John Moger, decided to stand down. This publicspirited act has saved the Parish a considerable sum of money and John is to be thanked for it. However, it is sad that for the first time in over 30 years there will not be a Parish Council Election in Braunston.

Four councillors, Sue Burge, Terry Fuller, Chris Miller and Mike Robinson, are retiring. Their hard work during their period of office has been very much appreciated.

has lived in Braunston for seven years after moving from Berkshire when he retired. As a canal enthusiast is keen to help protect and enhance the unique character of the village.


Lynne Whyte 890865

Village Hall news

Our fund now stands at just over £12,000 with over £100 added from our Cheese & Wine evening in April. Many thanks to all who attended and those who provided food and raffle prizes.

The village hall is run by a management committee consisting of up to 10 user group representatives and six elected members, plus up to 4 co-opted members. As the village hall is a registered charity, all members of the committee become charity trustees, and work in the interests of the charity in accordance with our constitution. The 6 village representatives are elected at the **A.G.M.**, which this year will take place on **Monday**, **22nd May**, **at 8.00 p.m.** in **the Old Library**. It is the opportunity for villagers to hear what has taken place over the past year, what is planned for the future, to examine the finances of the Village Hall and to vote for the 6 elected members. Everybody is welcome to attend. Don't let Granny have all the fun

Grandparents can (and do) use the village Internet service to learn as much about surfing the web as all youngsters do. But the service is for everyone of all ages.

Have you thought of the Internet service in the Village Hall as an Internet telephone box? The advantage is that it is free, and in the warm and dry.

It is available whenever the Village Hall is open. It can be activated by flicking a wall switch

The system has been used for a variety of reasons:-

- □ E-mails, particularly to friends and relatives abroad. (Of course the next visit is to see if there has been a reply!). You can also receive photographs by e-mail. It's easy to set up a FREE e-mail address
- ☐ Another common use has been to trace the family name or family tree.
- ☐ The system is available for shopping or banking a boon for those without transport and who rely on our limited bus service.
- Research on any subject you can think of. Several villagers have traced the location of War Graves of family members killed in the two World Wars. Look at the Braunston web site and see what's going on in the Village.
- Save money at the newsagent by accessing your newspaper on the web.

Help is available!

This is every Thursday evening from 7-00pm to 9-00pm and on two Wednesday afternoons per month from 2-00pm to 4-00pm.

You can come along for just a few minutes if you only want to do one quick job, or you can spend an hour or more surfing the web. All for free.

You don't have to book or make any arrangements in advance. Just turn up.

Why come?

Every advert seems to end in 'dot com'; don't be left behind – find out what it's all about and how to use it to your advantage. Research for home, school or office. It's fun.

What's available?

As well as Internet access there is a word processing facility, a printer and paper and a Touch Screen. The latter has recently been upgraded to include an entertainment section with film and video clips and BBC news online.

Euro-MP visit

Bill Newton-Dunn MEP opened a new boat building workshop for *Utopia* during a recent visit to the Daventry area. As well as calling at Braunston Marina he was guest of honour of Daventry Business Association.

Undergrounding of electric cables

East Midlands Electricity is to carry out a programme of undergrounding of its electricity supply cables in the Spinney Hill/Welton Road/Ashby Road area due to commence on 2 May 2000. The work is part of EME's ongoing work to upgrade its equipment.

A45 safety

On 6 April 2000, the Parish Council held a helpful and productive meeting with representatives of the Highways Agency. The result of the meeting is that with minor alterations, the safety measures previously agreed will be put into place. The intention is that the work will be done by the summer of this year.

The site visit to the road had the useful by-product of the men from the agency experiencing for themselves the high speeds of vehicles using the A45. This was in spite of the fact that most drivers hit the brakes when they saw three men in fluorescent yellow jackets who may just have been part of a police speed check.

Additional safety changes will be proposed arising out of the visit. These will include improvements to the lining in the Old Road/Marina area and changes to the village name signs to slow traffic and warn of bends. There was also Highways Agency support for police speeds checks. These suggestions will be passed to the Parish Council for comment before implementation.


A number of HGVs use Brindley Quays as a place to change direction on the A45. We in Braunston believe that this is because signs in Daventry are missed because they are inadequate. Having for a number of years contended that there is no problem; the Highways Agency is to review signage in Daventry again. In the meantime it accepts that 'improved signage is likely to resolve the problem'.

The grey mast is Orange

The Highways Agency agreed with Parish Councillors that the mast and box belonging to *Orange* which appeared by the side of the A45 about six weeks ago is in an unsafe position and should be moved. We have been informed since the site meeting that although *Orange* may have just about complied with the letter of the law in erecting the equipment, its procedures were below what should be expected. In any event items have to be placed in safe areas which the current site is not considered to be. We await events but we are probably all pleased to know that no company, however large, can put hardware just where it pleases.

As a number of the wooden poles which will be removed carry street lamps, the Parish Council is to take the opportunity to buy replacements rather than leave lamps on sawn off wooden poles. In addition a new lamp will be provided at the junction of Welton Road and Spinney Hill.

The undergrounding will not incur a direct cost to the village. The new lamps will cost £1176.



Vicar's Letter

Dear Parishioners,

New organ for All Saints' Church

The PCC is in the process of buying a new organ for the church. The organ comes from Ripon Cathedral in Yorkshire and is an electronic instrument. This does not mean however that we shall be losing the old organ. It will remain and be used and maintained as it has been in the past. The reason for acquiring a new organ is that it will enable us to broaden our repertoire. The current organ has a narrow keyboard and this means that certain pieces of music simply cannot be played.

The cost of the new organ is £7,500 but this is partly offset by a recent donation to the organ fund of £5,000. In addition, we have been given a substantial grant from the landfill tax scheme (£4,800) which will help us to re-order the back of the church to accommodate the instrument.

The instrument has been carefully vetted and represents good value—a new organ of equivalent specification would cost £80,000. There is some additional work that will need to be done to digitalise the working parts but we hope to install the new organ in May.

The village hall is well used by a wide range of groups from a children's playgroup to adult education classes. Whilst these groups are operating, there is usually access to the library although there may not be a volunteer to assist.

The LIAG programme – a county-wide initiative to improve information, advice and guidance for adults on learning and work opportunities – is committed to supporting Braunston Parish Council with this innovative project. We have already given support in obtaining additional IT equipment, such as a printer.

We could also offer:

- ☑ Internet links to useful website pages for careers information and advice

- ☑ noticeboards with literature from various organisations offering information, advice and guidance signposting and also providing information about voluntary organisations
- ☑ information that would be helpful for making career choices, identifying training or qualifications required and hints on (eg) how to prepare a CV
- Training to volunteers who might be interested in helping people find their way around the careers information and help with referral when appropriate
- ☑ drop in sessions, co-ordinated with voluntary organisations and community groups, giving people the opportunity to access information on a wide range of issues, including careers.
