Vicar's letter

Courage and Resilience

Throughout the pandemic I have been producing videos for the school to support their collective worship services. During the past few weeks I have returned to the school to deliver the services in person with a year group at a time. Over the past year I have considered various topics based on the school values to help the children in these very challenging times.

This term we are considering the topic of courage and resilience and I have used characters from the Bible, sports people, actors and singers to help us learn to face our fears, be courageous, and become more resilient as a result.

I thought it might be helpful for all of us to consider this topic especially after the year we've had and the challenges that lie ahead.

The psychologist Stephen A. Diamond suggests that 'courage is a kind of strength, power or resolve to respond to a frightening, disturbing or challenging situation soberly and directly rather than running from or avoiding it.'

Jesus knew what it was like to be afraid, but he also knew that he was not alone, that God was with him. Just as God is with us. 'Do not fear for I am with you. Do not be worried I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you. I will uphold you with my strong right hand' (Isaiah 41).

We're all afraid of something. I know for many the Covid virus and the easing of lockdown is causing many to be fearful and need courage just to leave home.

Diamond suggests that it can be a courageous and deeply encouraging act to confess our vulnerability, sensitivities, anxieties and despair to someone else. I'm afraid of dogs, the dark, and standing up to speak in front of people (not what you'd expect from a vicar!). I have learned that when I face my fears great things can happen. I have become more resilient, and it has given me courage to face new challenges.

I encourage the children to find someone they can talk to – it might be their teacher, friend, parents, and they can also pray and talk to God.

I wonder what you are afraid of. I hope you have someone you can talk to and know that you can talk to God as well. If I, or members of the church can help please get in touch. I pray that you can discover the courage to face those fears and find freedom to face new challenges.

Planning

The planning application to create a new cycle and walking route from Middlemore to the track above the canal tunnel portal was approved by Daventry District Council. However, conditions were put on the approval to address safety issues as follows:

Condition 6. Before the path is first brought into use, barriers, gates and or stiles are to be installed at the northern end of the path where it terminates at the canal access track and thereafter retained and maintained. They must not be removed or replaced without the prior written consent of the Local Planning Authority (LPA).

This is to prevent unfettered access to the canal access track and towpath along the canal from the western end of the Braunston Tunnel because in its present condition it is felt to be unsuitable for all users of the new path and not fit for purpose as a shared cycleway/pedestrian link. This can be reviewed should circumstances change in the future.

Condition 7. Before the path is first brought into use signs shall be installed with details to be submitted to and agreed in writing with the LPA. This signage scheme shall provide advance notice of the barriers referred to in condition 6 above and direction to alternative local footpath and bridleway routes. The signage scheme shall be retained and shall not be removed without the prior written consent of the LPA.

This is to ensure that users of the path are made aware in advance that unfettered access to the canal access track and towpath beyond will not be possible and to advise them of alternative routes they may wish to follow.

WI Bench

Approval was given for the WI to put a centenary bench opposite the bench in the garden at the corner of Cross Lane and High Street.

Parking on the High Street

Please do not obstruct the steps along the High Street. Parking in front of them makes it very difficult for pedestrians to access the raised pavement.

Annual Parish Meeting

In 2020 emergency legislation permitted not holding this public meeting. This does not apply in 2021. The law requires the council to hold a meeting between the start of March and the end of May. The meeting will be at 7.30pm on Monday 24th May. We will post the venue once everything has been confirmed. There may be the option of joining by zoom.

Archer Avenue

In March the Parish Council distributed a document to all households following complaints about the state of verges and kerbs. Thank you for your responses which have provided the council with further ideas about improvements that might be considered.

Matters regarding highways were previously the responsibility of Northamptonshire County Council and now come under West Northamptonshire Council. The Parish Council is working on a document that shows the problems and includes the residents' views. We will present this to West Northamptonshire Council and ask for their views on what, in practice, is possible and whether the budget for road improvements could include such schemes.

We will keep you informed in this section of the BVN.

Parish Council Applications

There will be no election in May for the Parish Council as there were only 9 people who were nominated.

Our thanks go to the three Councillors who are no longer standing as Parish Councillors, Graham, Tom and Robert who have given their time and have worked hard on behalf of the Council.

Braunston CAN (Climate Action Network)

The new mowing arrangements have started. The amenity grass areas including The Green and verges in residential areas will be mown every three weeks. This interval will keep the grass short enough for walking across and playing on but long enough to allow some low-growing plants such as clover to flower and provide a habitat for pollinating insects.

Some other areas where wildflowers such as ox-eye daisies and knapweed have been planted will next be mown in August. The spring mowing of the Butlin's Hill verge was cancelled to allow the daffodils to flower. More wildflower planting in these areas including the verge on the south side of Welton Road near Spinney Hill and a small part of the Churchyard will continue. In addition, the verge to the rear of the Wheatsheaf in Church Road is being planted with wildflowers by a local resident. The fringes of these areas will be mown regularly to maintain a neat appearance.

We are working with the Parish Council to make the maintenance of these areas more sustainable, reducing the mowing budget by £3000 and cutting carbon emissions by about 50%. The mowing intervals might vary a little depending on the weather and the availability of the contractor's staff.

Braunston CAN applied for an Action on Climate Change Grant from Daventry District Council. We were pleased to be awarded £895.60. This money will pay for a soil testing kit to help with wildflower and tree planting and for tools to be used to improve the hedges in Jetty Field so that they provide better habitat and store more carbon. It will also go towards the cost of an air quality monitor that we plan to use in the parish and for us to offer for work with school groups and other parishes.

We are a group of about twenty Braunston residents working to reduce the carbon emissions of the village and beyond. If you are interested in joining us, please message 07989 421836 or 07554 264742. Let us know if you would like to receive our email updates.

Braunston Walkers 17/4/21 Middlemore

Following lock down rules we set off in groups of six or less. We had 17 out on what turned out to be the finest of days, dry and very sunny with a slight breeze. It was great to get together again on such a fine day. Walking through Jetty Fields and the adjoining field to Dark Lane and past the Admiral Nelson we stayed on the track up to Top Lock where we joined the towpath to the gaping entrance of the dark, damp tunnel. We climbed the steps and set off uphill to Middlemore. Three of our members turned to walk up the field that will become the cycle route to have a shorter walk. The hill up to Middlemore seems never ending as you pass the vent towers of the tunnel but the horses that would have taken this route probably didn't complain.

At Middlemore we turned right to walk along the grass strip leading behind the houses to get to the old railway bridge and once across headed towards the huge warehouses that can be seen from the village. Mature trees planted to hide them are still very immature! The footpath around the units takes you to a gate onto the A45. On the other side of the road is the entrance to Kentle Woods. Created in 2000 as part of the Woodland Trust's 'Woods on your doorstep' projects, the trees have grown well and they disguise the factories behind.

We dropped downhill and through a very picturesque dry valley with distant views to Shuckborough and Napton. The path then took us past Berry Fields farm and down to a surprisingly dry Braunston Covert. From here we continued on the Jurassic Way up through a recently tilled but thankfully dry field and then turned left towards Old Road. This had been the main road until Thomas Telford changed the route for safety. The last climb was up from the Marina to Nibbits Lane, a sting in the tail at the end of a walk which was eased by calling in to the Old Plough for refreshments outside, spread out in the sunshine and many others were taking the same opportunity in the lovely weather.

Everyone had an enjoyable walk.



Braunston Canal Society

With the end of the lockdown in sight BCS is preparing to resume business as usual. A final task, prior to the opening of the canal system for leisure use, was an

Painting three of the six locks each year means the locks are painted every two years. Weather report for March

March temperature fluctuation ranged from -1.8° C at 3am on the 6th to a barmy afternoon of 23° C at 3pm on March 31st.

The barometer reached a high of 1035.6hpa on the 6th at 8am, with a low of 983.9hpa on the 11th at 5am.

With torrents of rain at the beginning of the month it then dried up with the last rain on the 26th. Leaving a total of 36.8mm for the month, drier than the village average of 55mm. Total rainfall so far this year is 156mm, the village 6 years' average is 157mm for the same period.

It was a gusty month with a single gust at 2.30am of 41.2mph on the 11th. It was a pickup the dustbins in the morning here, as they had taken a ride down the garden!

The sun did shine the brightest on the 25th at 10.50am 888.7w/m². The UV index was also the highest at 8 that day.

Finding poems in the fields

'I found the poems in the fields, and only wrote them down.' Wrote John Clare, Northamptonshire's finest, and most modest poet. He was certainly a simple man, a farm labourer who wrote like a carved angel in a country church. Read his poems and you will soon realise the words he weaves weren't just picked up on the miles and miles he walked across our county and much more widely. They were oh so carefully chosen, honed and woven into his fantastic verses. Clare started farm work while still a young child. At the same time he got some education at Glinton church. In his early adult years, Clare became a potboy in a local pub the Blue Boy. His first love was a rich farmer's daughter named Mary Joyce. Mary's father forbade her to meet him. He did all kinds of work, a gardener, a militia man, a lime burner and along the way travelled with gypsies. His poor diet from birth meant he never grew to more than five foot and may have been the main factor behind his poor health in later life.

Lockdowns may have shut pubs, churches, cinemas, restaurants and much else but they haven't shut down the chance to walk in the countryside on the fringes of our beautiful village. Whether you chose to strike out on a footpath across the fields or explore Braunston's boot -wearer's bonus - the canal towpath - you'll find that the virus has had hardly any real effect on the splendid views or our resilient yet ever changing wildlife. This present pandemic has made us all consider our own mortality. Life is too good to waste even a minute, or to have any regrets so I'll leave the last word to John Clare. He had a full and amazing life, but still he wrote "If life had a second edition, how I would correct the proofs."

Getting the BVN to your letterbox

Ever wondered how the BVN gets produced and delivered to you?

The deadline for items to be included in each edition is the 18th of the previous month. Leading up to that date regular contributors from village clubs and groups, the church, school, Parish Council and individual parishioners will be busy writing their pieces and sending them in to the BVN or dropping items off to the Post Office. We have at least 22 different organisations throughout a normal year who send items in.

Editors Alan and Sandra take it in turn to produce the BVN. From the 18th we work on putting together all the content using Publisher, a software programme. We receive things in several styles, some handwritten that need typing up, various fonts, font size, colour and formats. We convert them to a standard font of Arial size 11, line and paragraph spacing and alignment. We do this to get an overall style to the publication and for items to fit A5 page size. This can take quite a while to complete and it's sometimes a challenge fitting things into the space we have. Advertisements are an essential part of the content as they help fund the cost of the BVN and Peter Hobbs deals with all the financial side of things.

We also look for articles to put in as features. If you have any suggestions for the Features section do let us know. We are grateful for all the suggestions people have given us and for Peter's Country Notes.

Once everything is complete it goes to the other editor for proof reading. Mistakes are then corrected (we might miss some!) and it is converted into a format to send to the printers.

Our deadline for getting the final version to the printers is the 22nd of the month, to give time for printing and collating.

Once ready the printers contact Deb Hope who collects them from the printers in Norton and then divides them up by each delivery round to deliver to the homes of all the wonderful volunteers (over 20) who bring them to your door come rain, sunshine or snow.

The editors then put the month's issue onto Issuu online and the village website and Trines kindly puts a notice on the Bugle.






