Hazardous A45

Many months of pressure on the Highways Agency by the Parish Council culminated in a meeting in July last year, when the Agency accepted that improvements to the A45 could be made to increase safety standards. It was agreed that they would come back to the Parish Council with a programme of improvements. A plan has now been received showing the Agency's proposals. These are listed in full below.

- Upgrade the existing double bend warning signs with 'REDUCED SPEED NOW' plates and yellow backing boards.
- Upgrade the existing chevron boards at the A45/High Street bend with yellow backing boards.
- Provide new 'junction on bend' warning signs with yellow backing boards on both approaches to the High Street bend.
- Provide new staggered junction warning signs with yellow backing boards on both approaches to the Old Road / Braunston Marina junctions.
- Relocate the 'Road Narrows' warning sign that currently obscures the direction sign opposite Braunston Marina
- Provide 'SLOW' road markings, with a red surface treatment background, to the bend and junction warning signs.
- Upgrade the existing village name signs. The Agency will discuss various options with the Parish Council. They also recommended that the village name sign south of Braunston be relocated 90m south-east to improve forward visibility of the sign.

In addition, they thought that safety at the A45/Old Road and Braunston Marina staggered junction might be improved by relocating the bus stop that is now on the south side of the A45.

Two options were put forward for relocating this bus stop:-

- Relocation to a point 65m southeast; opposite Station Cottages, where a length of carriageway that appears to be narrow-width layby is currently hatched out.
- The second point is some 40m north west of the current location, to a point opposite the bus stop situated on the other side of the road.

Any relocation of the Bus Stop would need agreement from all interested parties and would be subject to a Safety Audit given the likely changes in traffic and pedestrian patterns.

The Parish Council will be having another meeting with the Highways Agency to look at the merits of painting an 'island' on the A45 at the Old Road junction.

The important issue of providing better signage and a speed reduction to the East (Daventry side) of Old Road, for the safety of residents and road users, has not been addressed and the Parish Council will be making further strong representations to the Highways Agency.

If you would like to see the proposed improvement scheme, the Plan is on display in the Old Library at the Village Centre.

Quincy-Voisins

Some of us will have been disappointed that the weather around Christmas was not more traditional with snow and frost. Others will have been very grateful that conditions were on the whole mild and trouble free. Sadly many areas of Europe were caught in horrific storms which claimed many lives and caused immense structural damage.

Braunston's French twin Quincy-Voisins was badly affected with three hundred houses suffering structural damage. More serious is the fact that the deputy mayor was killed by a fire engine while helping to clear up storm debris.

The Parish Council has written to Quincy's mayor expressing sympathy. There may be very little of a practical nature which we can do but knowing of our concern must be of some comfort.

Watch Out

There's an epidemic about and it's costing you money. There appears to be a 'litter bug' in the village at the moment. The Parish pays for 10 hours of litter picking a week. This with extra cleaning provided by the District Council should be more than enough to keep our village tidy but recently we appear to have been overwhelmed by litter. Perhaps some people still do not realise that it is an offence to drop litter in a public place. We are lucky enough to live in a lovely village, lets make it even nicer by keeping it clean and tidy.

Police Matters

In the period 1 April 1999 to 5 December 1999 24 crimes were committed in the village which were reported to the police. Of these 5 have been solved.

Dog Waste Bins

The Parish Council is in the process of applying to the County Council for permission to place two additional red dog waste bins in the village. This move in addition to the free Whoopsie Bag scheme illustrates the council's intent to keep the village as clear as possible of dog faeces.

Although the Parish Council will pay for the bins the County Council has to give its permission as they will be sited on the public highway. The proposed sites are the top of Ashby Road and the path from Church Road to Ashway.

Important Notice

By now every Household should have received a copy of the Ward Action Service Plan questionnaire from the District Council. Since July 1998, when the first Village Improvement Scheme questionnaire was received and following two well attended public meetings, it has been clear that the majority of villagers support the proposed improvements. If Braunston is to receive the funding for this important scheme it is essential that you once again show your support by completing your questionnaire and returning it to the District Council before February 18th.



Are you paying the correct water charges?

It came to light recently that some residents were paying too much for their water. Charging for water is quite complicated which makes checking bills difficult. Put simply, we in Braunston should pay for water received at Angian Water rates and for sewerage and surface water drainage at Severn Trent rates. If anyone thinks that they may be paying incorrectly or wants to check, the Parish Council has prepared an information sheet which can be obtained from either Janet McCarthy (890336) or Geoff Waghorn (890698).

There is a choice of how to pay for surface water drainage if you have a meter. Payment may either be based on rateable value or property type the customer choosing whichever is the most beneficial. Broadly, it is worth considering property type charging rates if rateable value is above the levels below.

Vicar's Letter

Dear Parishioners,

Did you know that All Saints' Braunston gives 10% of its income to charity every year? The reason for this comes from the Bible (Leviticus 27:30) and it is a principle that most churches keep to. But in the first instance the commandment applied to everyone - not just churches. In other words, we are all expected to give to charity. For some it might mean giving less than 10% - obviously family circumstances will differ - but the essential message remains the same - God wants us to be generous in what we give.
