Vicar's Letter

Dear All,

Thank you to those who spoke to me regarding our Millennium Project and for suggesting other good causes. After a good deal of discussion, the Parochial Church Council (PCC) finally decided to adopt HOPE AND HOMES FOR CHILDREN as its preferred charity. I am glad to say that most people were supportive of this charity, though some did question helping a charity overseas. It is sometimes said that charity begins at home but I don't think there is anyone who would be unmoved by the video which HOPE AND HOMES CHILDREN has made. Where in our own country are there children, wandering around sick and starving who have lost both parents through war and are at the peril of gunmen on the rampage? Yes, there is poverty in this country and some children do suffer as the result of neglect but nothing like on the scale that happens in some parts of the world. For those other good causes which people suggested, they will be considered amongst the other donations which the church makes to charity each year. Now that our project has been launched, we hope to raise £10,000 as soon as possible. You can help by coming to our Lent Lunches for example, which happen on Saturdays during Lent from 12.30 am. Enjoy a bowl of soup (always tasty!) and roll of bread. Then there is the FLOWER FESTIVAL over the Boat Show weekend. This event is not only to celebrate 150 years of Braunston Church but will also be in aid of HOPE AND HOMES FOR CHILDREN. Finally, if you didn't manage to see the recent showing of "This is Your Life" which featured Colonel Mark Cook OBE, the man behind HOPE AND HOMES FOR CHILDREN, then I have a video of the charity's work which anyone is most welcome to borrow. Village Notes......from our archives.....written by Dick Herne for the February 1993 issue

On the south side of High St. between Cross Lane and the Green the tall stuccoed house with the slate roof has a varied history. In the early 19th century before the 1834 Poor Law set up District Workhouses - so called because the inmates had to work for their keep - it housed the homeless poor. Then it became a coffee house. More recently it was a general shop and is now a private residence. Next door the Old Forge is unususual in two respects. It was built of brick and the west end was a smithy belonging to Sam Cowley, the village blacksmith. The blocked up coal shute is still visible in the wall. Beyond the adjoining bungalows is a row of stone cottages; the first one bearing the plaque marked "R.E.M. 1742" was once a village inn. Next to the row is footpath, Burden Lane, leading to the Archer Avenue estate. This had replaced a huddle of old cottages which housed many canal workers and brickyard labourers
