Village Notes - Dick Hearne.

The coming of the canals transformed life in Braunston. The first to open was the Coventry and Oxford canal in 1790 linking the industrial Midlands with the Thames, London and the export market. Its course followed the contour round the ridge on which the village stood and turned right under the Chester Road. Then it wound its way across the fields and over the Leam by an aqueduct beyond Wolfhamcote Church. The short cut from the double iron bridge in Braunston across the valley to Wolfhamcote came later in 1829. Digging the canal occupied many labourers known as navvies (navigators) from their work. Many more found regular work loading and unloading goods. The price of coal and manufactures in the district fell sharply.

The success of the canal led to another venture - the Grand Junction Canal from Braunston to London. This involved the construction of locks and a tunnel between Braunston and Welton. Most of it was complete by 1800 but the Blisworth tunnel was not finished until 1805. The locks drained water from the summit into three reservoirs; it was then pumped back by a Boulton and Watt beam engine sited above Bottom Lock. This was replaced by an engine housed nearer the canal in a building with a tall chimney stack dated 1895. The reservoirs have recently been connected to the canal and now are extensively used as moorings for boats which use the canal for pleasure cruising.
