## Village Notes by Dick Herne

For centuries Braunston farmland was divided into large open fields which were cropped in rotation e.g. wheat - barley - and fallow every third year. Each field was divided into strips giving the plough a long run before the oxen had to turn. The average villager rented several strips in each field and some had small "closes" i.e. hedged areas. This system gave everyone a share of good and poor land but the better farmers were at the mercy of their less capable neighbours. It was necessary to obtain a private Act of Parliament to alter the system. In 1774 the progressive farmers succeeded in gaining the right to enclose land. Some was reserved for the Rector in lieu of tithe and a token amount for the relief of the The local landscape took on its familiar poor. pattern of hedged fields which farmers cultivated according to their own needs and the demands of the markets.
