VILLAGE NOTES. The appearance of a Kingfisher on the canal is worthy of note. They appear as a brilliant flash of cobalt blue, skimming low over the water or diving to seize small fish. Wagtails are now haunting the gardens, and the robins have staked out their territorial claims, each jealously watching his special patch which he regards his own private estate.

Almost all our summer visitors, swallows and martins, have departed, though one martin was still here on the 20th October. He must have an affection for our village. A sparrow was examining a deserted nest, expecting to have vacant possession. In crevices, in sheds or trees we can find two interesting and useful insects - the Ladybirds (2 or 7 spot are commonest, though there are other varieties) are pretty and useful as larvae consume large quantities of greenfly, to which they are very welcome.

We may also find the skin of a caterpillar surrounded by a dozen or more tiny lemon yellow cocoons of the Ichneumon Fly. The eggs from which they have developed were injected into the body of the caterpillar while the pest was active. The eggs hatched to release grubs which fed on the unwilling host, and we now see the pupae. These will open next year, releasing the adults, and continue to prey on the caterpillars. May they long continue their good work.
