VILLAGE NOTES. The shedding of leaves from trees and hedgerows in the autumn makes the observation of birds much easier - like the quick darting movements of the wren, the perky little robin and the fussy fluttering of sparrows. The garden too attracts more visitors in search of food - insects in milder weather, and scraps of food, bread fat etc., When the ground is frozen. In sheds or outbuildings, we may find the shrunken skin of a caterpillar surrounded by a cluster of tiny lemon yellow cococns - the pupae of an Ichneumon Fly. There are a few varieties of this insect in Britain. They appear in spring, and the female pierces the skin of the caterpillar with an egg laying tube like a hypodermic needle. The eggs are inserted into an unlucky caterpillar where larvae hatch and feed on their unwilling hosts flesh, preventing him from growing up to be the Cabbage White Butterfly. These flies provide an effective check on the growth of the caterpillar population, and thus help to preserve all plants of the Brassica (Cabbage) family. Like the sale of the sal
