Their value as pollinators can hardly be overestimated, since they are at work long before the honey bees are about, and continue long after they have retired. The nesting swans on the Canal have produced six handsome cygnets, delighting residents of Braunston and also our numerous summer visitors, as they make their passage over the water with such dignity and self assurance. Hitherto, they have been spared the attentions of air gun and small bore rifle marksmen. All wild hirds are protected by law, and it is a punishable offence:-

to shoot 1) from or across a public highway.

2) Over any ground, without the permission of the owner.

Heavy fines can be levied on those transgressing these laws.

BRAUNSTON W.I. Every alternate year, a member of Braunston W.I. attends the Annual General Meeting at the Royal Albert Hall as our delegate. This year, however, it was the turn of the link Institute - Welton, to go. Members heard the report on the meeting, which was attended by 6,000 delegates from all over the British Isles, and this meeting was the first under the changed non-Political, non-sectarian rule. The hitherto banned subject of family planning was resolved "with surprising ease". Other resolutions concerned more money for the maintenance of Inland Waterways, for aid to objectors at Flanning Enquiries, Nursery Education, and for improving the conditions and prospects of the Police Force. Flowers and fruit were sent to the Chairman and Vice Chairman, Mrs. W. Montgomery and Mrs. E.F. Hall - both absent from the meeting through illness. The speaker for July was Mrs. Deacon, of South Kilworth, who gave a demonstration on the making of cold deserts, the results of which were sampled by members. A visit was also made to a Pottery at Byfield where Mr. Maund (who teaches the art class of the W.I. in Braunston) showed his skill as a potter. The next meeting on Sept. 5th will include slides by Mr. D. Read and a talk on "Touring Britain with Camera and Caravan".

OUTSET. I am sure that many of you would like to know the result of the Survey carried out in May by the Department of Social Service and the Voluntary Organisation "Outset". Almost 77% of the households were visited, and the organisers tell me that they were very pleased with this response. They have asked me to thank you all for taking part. We would also like to say a particular thank you to all those who gave time and energy to deliver and collect the forms. The survey has established that 62 people are handicapped or impaired, and the Dept. of Social Service will hold further interviews where its services could be of value.
