VILLAGE NOTES. The warm days of late August and early September helped to produce a record corn harvest, and the heaviest crop of blackberries for many years. We depend on our fruit canners and deep freezes for fruit supplies throughout the year, whereas a few years ago the fruits of the hedgerow and garden were preserved at home for use in the winter months. The warm weather also brought out an abundance of butterflies, including the Red Admirals and Peacocks. Caterpillars of the Cabbage White Butterfly are now seeking places in which they can become Chrysalids from which they hope to emerge in the spring as perfect insects. Some will have within them the egg of the Ichneumon flies and these caterpillars will serve as food for the larvae of this useful fly and ultimately a number of tiny lemon yellow cocoons will develop. These should be left to emerge as perfect insects, useful in reducing the number of caterpillars next year.
