VILLAGE NOTES. We should soon see the Autumn Migration of Birds from Northern Regions to their more southerly quarters. The swifts have already gone. Skains of wild geese, flying in a V formation, occasionally pass this way. Rough weather at sea sends gulls to inland reservoirs, rivers and canals. The black headed gulls appear to be with us all the year round. Out of the breeding season, they lose the dark brown coloration of the head. Occasionally, terns may come inland. Their graceful flight has earned them the name "sea swallows". They hover over the water, and having selected their prey, plummet with a splash, to emerge with their victim.
