Dear Parishioner,

You do not need us to tell you how costs have increased over the past few years or of how they are continuing to rise.

Just as these costs affect everyone of us, so they also affect your Parish Church and the Diocese as a whole. Our Church is one of outstanding beauty being one of the finest examples of Victorian Gothic architecture in England. You may not be aware that each parish has to contribute a Share, from which the salaries of the Clergy are drawn, grants to Training Colleges for Teachers and Clergy, Family and Social Welfare, etc.

Many of you expressed surprise when reading in a recent News Letter that the cost of heating the church is £600 a year. The Church itself and all its furniture and fittings have to be maintained, and also the Churchyard and Rectory, apart from our commitments to the Diocese.

Last year, for the first time, our expenditure exceeded our income, and also, for the first time for many years, we are appealing directly to YOU for assistance in meeting these costs. The Parochial Church Council has studied ways in which it can put its own house in order, and also various ways of raising funds.

There are many who do not attend Church regularly, but who, nevertheless, do like to know that the Church and Clergy are there when you need them even if only for Weddings, Christenings and Bu rials.

If you feel you would like to help us by making a donation, however small, please complete the slip at the bottom of this letter and return to either the Rector or one of the Church Wardens. (5p. per week = £2.60 per annum, and this, given by say 100 parishioners, would realise a figure of £260 a year, which would help to maintain YOUR Church).

Your continued support of the Fete to be held on July 5th will be greatly appreciated.

Please do give this matter your earnest consideration, and don't throw the letter away as being "just another circular".
