VILLAGE NOTES.

Men who live close to nature retain certain characters which people living in urban areas have lost. The moons circling round the planet Jupiter were observed by the eyes of the North American Indians centuries before Galileo in the 16th Century observed them through the then newly invented telescope. Dogs and guinea fowls can perceive sounds so small that our hearing is by comparison very dull indeed. Several insects have a sense of smell and direction which makes our corresponding sense appear almost non-existent. Moths can smell a partner with which they mate at a distance of some miles.
