VILLAGE NOTES. In winter, one of the problems is to keep warm - especially for the elderly, whose blood circulation has become less active than it was in their youth. Bodily warmth depends as much on the food we eat as on our heating system. A balanced diet and exercise for the young provide the warmth, but exercise is not so easy for the older generation. As good neighbours we try to give that little extra care to the less active residents in the village.

The animal kingdom copes in various ways with generating and preserving heat. Earthworms burrow more deeply to avoid extreme cold of the few top inches of soil. Many adult insects die in the autumn, leaving chrysalids to hatch out in the spring. Among the wasps and bees, only egg laying females survive in a
