VILLAGE NOTES. Many people visit an Agricultural Show, and enjoy most of all the of the sheep dog trials, where the two collies directed by their master round up a flock of sheep and guide them through a space between two posts. The work is done by the collies acting on instructions from their shepherd, whose whistling gives signals only understood by his two faithful servants. This is interesting, but to see collies really in action we must go to a wide expanse of moorland - Exmoor, Wales, Yorkshire or the Northumberland moors. The grass is very sparse and so the sheep may be dispersed over two or three square miles as they forage amongst heather and bracken. A small army of men would find difficulty in gathering the flock, but two dogs, directed by whistles of their master round up their charges in a very short time. To the collie this is all in the day's work and is natural to him. To train dogs to sit up and beg, or to walk on his hind legs, is an affront to a dignified friend. Animals are happy following their own skills, and must feel insulted when urged to do tricks just to amuse humans, but against their own instincts.
