VILLAGE NOTES. At the February meeting of the Parish Council it was decided that we would take part in the Tidy Village Competition in which ALL are asked to KEEP THE VILLAGE TIDY. At the March meeting our name was entered in the "BRITAIN IN BLOOM" competition. All whose gardens are open to public display are asked to make a special effort so that the Village will be gay with flowers. One of the fascinating features of a Nature Reserve is the way in which animals and plants preserve a balance - the animals using plants for food and the plants in turn using for their sustenance discarded animal matter. Smaller animals may provide meals for flesh eating birds or mammals but some die in other ways - interred by Burying Beetles. Nature's undertakers remove soil from beneath the corpse until it reaches a certain depth, and then cover it. This is not done out of respect for the deceased but to provide food for the larvae hatched from eggs laid in the body. Ultimately the corpse is rendered usable by plants, and the circle of life continues.
