VILLAGE NOTES. Occasionally, accidents occur when aircraft spraying crops deposit their load beyond the bounds of their target.

The aim of the sprayer is to eliminate some nuisance which has a damaging effect on crops, but that is not the only result - and in putting one thing right he sometimes put two things wrong.

Insecticides often achieve effects other than those intended. Not only do they kill the gardeners' enemies, caterpillars and rootflies of cabbages, carrot flies, and green and black flies on beans, but also our friends Ichneumon flies, lady birds, even the dreaded wasps and centipedes which help to keep down the plant eaters.

Small animals and birds living on insects too can be poisoned in this way. This spraying should be carefully controlled whether in garden or field. As one farmer said "Carelessly used they put one thing right and two wrong".
