VILLAGE NOTES. At the January Meeting of the Parish Council, the suggestion was made that walking along the footpaths could be made easier if we all cleared away the snow from the fronts of our own dwellings. Should we have an elderly or infirm neighbour, perhaps we could clear their section of the path as well as our own. Ice and Snow are not conducive to outdoor NatureStudy but they afford opportunities not available in milder conditions.

We often wonder at the ability of hounds to follow a trail, but only in snow conditions can we ourselves track the footprints of birds and animals. The thin covering of snow on the ice on the canal was rich in tracks of a fox, seagulls, swans, coots, and the three toed feet of a heron. Without doubt the heron was looking for food. The ice prevented him from fishing, and the insects - frogs etc. on land were hibernating. During the winter of 1962/3 when the frost was much more severe than we have experienced this year (so far) many of these handsome birds perished through starvation.

Our herons appear to have stayed with us, though some migrate to the sea shore, where small shellfish, sand lice, and other crustaceans are available between low and high water marks. Only in exceptionally severe weather does ice form in this area.

Migration to the sea shore in winter is a habit of many upland birds like woodcock, curlew and snipe. Now they will be saying - like us - "Roll on Spring".
