CONFIRMATION CLASSES.

These will be held on Thursdays, starting on 8th March.
The Order of Confirmation (1662) says: "The Church hath thought good to order,
that none hereafter shall be confirmed, but such as can say the Creed, the Lord's
Prayer, and the Ten Commandments; can also answer such questions as in the Short
Catechism are contained". Those who want to be confirmed must be taught the
fundamentals of the Christian Faith. The Creed tells us our Belief - The Lord's
Prayer teaches us how to pray, and the Ten Commandments tell us how to live. Now
the Short Catechism asks the question: What dost thou chiefly learn by these Command-
ments? I learn two things: My duty towards God, and my duty towards my neighbour.
Duties, not rights. How wrong we are as a Nation to put rights before duties, and
because of this fact we are suffering all kinds of things today. The summary of my
duty to God in the Catechism is terrific, and my duty to my neighbour is one of the
greatest truths that we all need to know. Every single one of us needs to look at
these duties again. When did you last look at the Catechism?

VILLAGE NOTES.

Children playing in their sledges or ski-ing enthusiasts may regret the melting of the recent snow, but few adults will agree with them. Motorists and lorry drivers, forced to abandon their vehicles throughout the length and breadth of the country have described it as the white curse. However, having said that we must give credit where it is due, and add that snow performs very useful services.

As the hexagonal crystals fall they trap air so that a layer of snow a few inches deep contains large quantities of air, which acts as a blanket protecting the soil and young plants from the ravages of severe frost. Tender plants like Autumn sown wheat are saved, and the earliest flowers of spring - like snowdrops and winter aconite may blossom in the shelter provided, and reveal themselves as soon as the thaw melts their covering.

Birds face great difficulties in the hard conditions - in finding food when their usual sources are covered.

Now that the weather has improved, we can derive great pleasure in finding which tune is produced by which feathered chorister. In order to do this the golden rule was given by the great ornithologist Lord Grey of Fallodon - quoting St. Paul - "Study to be quiet".

Dear Friends,

Last year saw the sad closure of the Methodist Chapel in the village because of the difficulties of financing the institution. Within the next few years we might see the closure of the Church of England's building if you do not care enough.

Most people in the village want services when there are christenings, weddings or funerals in the family but do not give the place a further thought at any other time. Somehow though, the church has to be kept going and the number of people who are willing to contribute to its upkeep seems to be diminishing year by year. In 1979 the members of the church will have to find £1360 to make a partial contribution to the Rector's stipend and the upkeep of his house and other finances of the Peterborough diocese. In addition we have to buy oil to keep the church heated and this has cost us £400 this winter alone. Repairs and maintenance of the building have to be taken care of at regular intervals and an impending charge will be the pointing of the west side of the church.

If you care about the Christian life of the village and if you want to retain the services of a church in Braunton will you make a contribution to All Saints? If you can would you make a regular contribution to help to support your Parish Church?

Don't let us lose another of our historic buildings in the 1980's.
