VILLAGER NOTES. An entertaining bird of our fields well worth watching is the Flower (pewit or pipit). A few years ago ornithologists feared lest it should become extinct. This bird feeds on insects etc. found in fields, where the extensive use of insecticides has taken a heavy toll of birds. At a casual glance the plumage appears to be black and white but the dark feathers are green and purple - like shot silk. The wings are rounded at the end and the distinctive plume on top of the head gives the jaunty appearance of a Tyrolean hat. The rounded wings help in identifying the bird, and its wheeling and turning make a fascinating study in robotics. The nest is only a hollow scratched in the surface of the soil and the mottled eggs match the surrounding earth - a wonderful piece of camouflage. The chicks run about almost as soon as they are hatched. At this stage they are liable to become a meal for some wandering hawk or crow, so they soon learn to freeze to the soil - and are almost impossible to see. The parent bird will then trail a wing - pretending to be lame and run off the predator.
