ROAD ACCIDENTS. It appears that the rules of the Ministry of Transport - like those of the Nedies and Persians, cannot be broken or altered, as NO SPEED LIMIT (according to their rating) can be imposed on that stretch of road from the top of Braunston Hill to the Willoughby side of Boswell's Bridge - although the parishioners of Braunston are asking for this.

The reason for the refusal to impose such a limit is - that it is not a built-up area within the meaning of the laws of the Environment.

As parishioners, we must persevere in trying to amend this ruling, and press for the imposition of a speed limit in order to save lives in accidents like those which are tragically TOO NUMEROUS.

PASTORAL MEASURE - 1968. Proposed change of Parochial Boundaries, Barby-Braunston.

VILLAGE NOTES. Once again our summer bird visitors, swallows, martins and swifts have arrived after spending the winter months in warmer climates. They choose their home, however temporary, according to the availability of a supply of insects to feed themselves and their offspring. Were it not for our feathered friends the insects would create havoc with our field and garden crops. That birds disappeared in the autumn has long been noted by observant countrymen - long before there were telegraph wires on which they assembled for their departure. Where they went remained a mystery. One 18th Century Author claimed that they spent the winter in the mud of ponds and rivers, but a very observant and accurate recorder of Natural History - the Rev. Gilbert White, of Selbourne, in the same century, conjectured that like bats, they hibernated, but was truthful enough to say that he had no proof of this. He learned from his brother serving in Gibraltar that swallows passed over there in spring and autumn - and until scientific ringing was organised the destination of migrants was an unsolved mystery.
