BRAUNSTON YOUNG WIVES. We had an excellent talk by Mr. M. Furber, a Rugby Veterinary Surgeon, on 11th September. Mr. Furber also answered many questions, and it was disappointing that so few members were able to attend this meeting. A reminder that our A.G.M. is on the 13th November, and new members will be very welcome on that date.

VILLAGE NOTES. This year, throughout the country, we have seen a record number of winged greenfly (aphids). Every cob web in the garden has trapped a quantity of them, and as they dance in the air they appear to make a cloud. Generally they are wingless and reproduce young inside their bodies, repeating this process often during the summer season.

Fortunately birds and insectivorous insects like lady birds, hover-flies etc. find them tasty, but this year lady birds have been too scarce to keep the aphids in check.

In the late summer winged greenfly produce eggs which they lay in crevices in tree bark or similar places, staying there over winter to hatch out in the spring in order to continue the life cycle.

The large quantities of vegetable matter in their system result in an excessive amount of sugar in their bodies. This they excrete, leaving a sticky layer on leaves and stems of their host plant. Ants, fond of sugary foods, enjoy eating this sweet substance so much that certain varieties of ants keep aphids, from which they suck the sweet liquid, regarding them as we do milch cows.
