VILLAGE NOTES. Few nature insects survive the winter, but chrysalids continue the race next year. Exceptions, which may be found in odd corners of our houses or sheds, being Tortoiseshell, Peacock, and Rear Admiral butterflies. However as the weather grows colder, insects make their way into shelter where most die. This gives us an opportunity to examine them in detail. The strongest wings of any British insects belong to the dragonflies. The forepart of the wing is a very strong strut, behind which the veins are arranged at right angles. The veins become less strong towards the rear of the wing as the strain in flight becomes less. The material of which the wing is made is used to obtain maximum strength - on the same principal employed by aircraft designers. No wonder that the small city boy who saw a dragon fly for the first time exclaimed "What a tiny plane".
