The greatest acrobats of the British birds are the Tits, whose antics, when feeding from a piece of suet hung up, or a bag of nuts, are both interesting and amusing. Starlings copy the Tits, but the Tits need no tuition. Throughout Britain, seven or eight varieties of Tits are recorded. Of these, four varieties can be seen in our neighbourhood, three of which can be seen in our gardens in winter.

The pretty Blue Tit is unmistakable, with bright blue head, wings and tail, white cheeks and yellow underparts.

The Coal Tit is much less impressive, with his grey-ish wings, buff front, black head and white cheeks. He is most easily identified by the triangular white patch on the nape of his neck.

The Great Tit is a handsome bird with a black crown, nape of the neck, throat, and a wide stripe down its bright yellow breast.

Seldom, if ever, seen in the garden is the Long Tailed Tit - so named because its black tail is as long - or perhaps slightly longer than its body. It has a white crown and its underparts are pink. It haunts woods and bushy hedgerows.

In winter they congregate in groups. The Long Tailed Tit's nest is very

cunningly constructed of moss, feathers etc. As all feed on insects, they are the friends of gardeners and farmers.
