VILLAGE NOTE. Village residents feel that the departure of Mr. & Mrs. John Thompson from the Village Bakery has severed a link with the past. For over seventy years Mr. Thompson's family has supplied bread and other bakery products in Braunston and the surrounding Villages in all weathers, and always with a cheery word. We all wish them a well earned and happy retirement.

Only a person with a very warped mind could fail to enjoy the sight of a well kept flower bed in a garden, or a mass of wild flowers in a meadow, a woodland, or a moor - especially those which appear early in the year. However, a plant produces flowers, not for our pleasure but to ensure the continuation of its species.

Several trees produce inconspicuous but interesting flowers. Such trees are willows, hazels, poplars, alders and oaks, whose flowers are catkins. Some willows produce the "pussy" catkins with bright yellow pollen bearing stamens. The catkins of the female tree are a dull grey-green colour, and produce the seeds after fertilisation. The "lamb's tails" of the hazels bear the stamens whereas the female catkin is like a small bud seated on a branch from which threadlike pistils wait to catch the pollen. This, in turn will develop into the nut.

Pollination is affected by the wind but this is an extremely wasteful method of fertilisation. A pollen bearing catkin flicked with a finger releases a cloud of microscopic pollen grains.
