VILLAGE NOTES. Most English people love to own and cultivate a garden. We should remember with gratitude our predecessors who, by patient work sele wild flowers, and by cross polination developed the brightly coloured flower which today adorn our gardens.

The cowslip - a member of the primrose family, has been developed to give us the Primulas. selected

Several of our fruit trees were originally brought from abroad by soldiers of the Roman garrisons eighteen or nine teen centuries ago. Enlisted from different provinces of an Empire which stretched from the Atlantic Ocean to the Euphrates, these men tried to re-create the gardens of their home lands by importing a wide variety of plants. Probably many plants would not grow in our colder climate, but some fruit trees were introduced in this way. We imported the potato, the runner bean, sweet corn, tomato and the pumpkin from South America. All of these vegetables and many others had been cultivated by the Incas centuries before the Spanish Conquistadores destroyed a civilisation which in their blind hatred and greed they were too ignorant to understand.
