VILIAGE NOTES. An unwelcome visitor occasionally appears in our homes — The Giant Wood Wasp. This insect gives the impression of a stinging insect. Probably among our insects only the dragon fly is larger. The wing span of the wasp is about two inches and its body about one inch — from which a tail (what appears to be a sing) about three eighths of an inch protrudes. This is not a sting, but a tool capable of boring a hoje in pinewood, where it lays an egg which hatches from a grub. This lives for a number of years before becoming a pupa from which the adult insect emerges.

This insect, though termed a wasp, does not sting. The true wasp has a distinct narrow waist, joining the thorax (chest) and abdomen and has several black and yellow bands. The body of the wood wasp is cylindrical with two wide black bands. Wood used in building may contain these insects which began life while the tree still stood — only emerging much later when the timber is incorporated into the house. a distinct of the
