minute crocodile was disturbed. It was moved in Braunston, an animal like a minute crocodile was disturbed. It was a newt - one of our amphibia (the Greek word means that this animal is capable of living either on land or in water). In addition to Newts this family includes frogs and Toads. They are cold blooded creatures - i.e. they cannot control their body heat as can dogs, sheep, and humans, but remain at the temperature of the air or water in which they are living. Therefore when the temperature of the air or water drops too low for comfort they must find winter quarters in which to hibernate.

They breathe as much through their skin as through their poorly developed lungs and so they must remain moist - in a damp place free from frost. All of this frogs and toads leave the water but are restricted to fairly damp habitats, and return to the water to breed. As well as their lives as tadpoles, news spend most of their adult lives in water, coming on land only occasionally. The food of these animals is largely made up of insects and so they are good friends to the gardener
