VILLAGE NOTES. The word Millions is often loosely used to indicate a large number A large flock of starlings was described as one of millions, but a few thousands would have been nearer the mark.

In one section of the plant world, to speak of millions would be quite in order. Fungi are truly prodigal in spore production. The puff ball, when it comes to maturity, is like a ball of brown paper with a hole at the top, from which literally millions of spores are emitted in a brown cloud. If all these developed to the full the earth would be covered in puff balls - perhaps only one of the

millions would develop.

The cap of a mushroom four inches in diameter, laid on a sheet of paper, will produce the pattern of the gills, from which spores are shed. Mycologists have calculated that such a mushroom cap could shed 16,000,000,000 spores - no one, as far as can be ascertained, has counted them.

An interesting fungus found recently is the Earth Star. Like an improved version of the puff ball, it has a thicker outside skin which splits in the manner in which we peel an orange, cutting the skin from the top almost to the bottom and then spreading out. Inside this is a small round sack emitting spores as does its less elaborate relative.
