In digging our gardens we are turning over a miniature world. Invisible to anyone not using a powerful microscope, are organisms which transform dead plant and animal matter into chemicals which can be used by plants growing there.

Visible to our eyes are earthworms of various types. In a pile of decaying vegetation like a manure heap they are numerous, as their food supply is abundant. These earthmanure or leaves from the soil surface to the roots where they are needed. In very cold or dry weather the worms penetrate the soil still deeper to escape the discomfort of cold or drought. At times the body of the worm carries what looks like a broad belt, with a yellowish tinge. This is an egg case which, when ready is shed. The cylinder closes at each end, making a lemon shaped cocoon containing six eggs, of which only one developes.
