ERAUNSTON C. OF E. SCHOOL In his Will dated 2nd May, 1733, William Makepeace gave trustees some land - the rents and profits to be used in the education of children school in Braunston. In 1933, there was a celebration "... to commemorate the Bi-Centenary of the Foundation of the School". Mr. W.J. Gould was the Headmaster at that time. व रे

May 1983 will be the 250th Anniversay of this gift by William Makepeace. We would like to celebrate this event, and hope that others in the village will join in. There will be a meeting in school on November 2nd at 8 p.m. for people who are interested in discussing village celebrations which could be held during May, 1983. Although this date seems to be far in the future, it is in 19 months' time, and it is always necessary to begin the planning stage of any celebrations at an early date. Which manage to digest the dead remains of other plants. To reach the sumlight, forest trees grow upwards and produce straight trunks.

Other less robust plants, instead of using their own materials, use the stems of their stronger neighbours to assist in their upward climb. Wild roses use their prickles, goosegrass uses small protuberances, ivy uses rootlike suckers to climb. We often think that plants are incapable of feeling, but the runner bean, and also that bane of the gardener's life, bindweed, or convolvulus, just need to touch a stake, and they proceed to wind themselves round it - always in the same direction. If we try to wind it in the opposite direction, the plant returns to the original winding pattern.

Edible and sweet peas, and their relatives the vetches, extend a tendril which grasps something to assist it to rise.
