VILLAGE NOTES Newspaper articles showing some interest in Nature Study generally mention the dawn chorus of the birds - one of the most attractive features of our English Spring, but another less conspicuous feature is the reawakening of life in the plant world. Although the last winter has been very harsh our Climate in January and February is mild compared with conditions on the continent of Europe. The earliest flowers to appear are the snowdrops, winter aconite, followed close behind by those two garden weeds groundsel and chickweed. Ladies interested in flower arrangement may not easily recognise as flowers those of the hazel, alder, poplar and birch - the catkins known to children as lambs tails. These are the staminate flowers which when stirred in the breeze release masses of pollen to fertilize the pistillate catkins, which in the case of the hazel are rather like leaf buds with four or five bright red three-lobed pistils protruding from the top. At the time when the pollen is ready for distribution, a flick of the finger on the catkin will release a small yellow cloud. The staminate flowers of conifers - especially those of the Cedar of Lebanon, will produce an even more massive cloud. Wind distribution of pollen is extremely wasteful and so the plant produces huge masses of pollen grains though only a small number will succeed in fertilizing to produce a seed.
