VILLAGE NOTES. Attempts to classify plants and animals have been made since the days of the Greek philosophers of 400 B.C. but the modern classification was begun in the 18th Century by a Swedish botanist, Carl Linnaeus. He began by separating 1) Flowering plants - those whose reproductive parts, stamens, pistils, seed boxes etc. were visible from -

2) Flowerless plants, those whose reproductive parts could not be seen.

The flowering plants included a vast variety as different as the wild rose, the orchid, stinging nettles, oak and pine trees.

Linnaeus lived before the discovery of the compound microscope, or he would have been aware of the reproductive parts of the flowerless plants - ferns, liverworts, mosses etc., and algae, which vary in size from tiny one-celled plants, to the huge seaweeds which are occasionally washed up on the sea shore.

Mosses are found in every climate on earth, from the polar ice-cap to steaming jungle. Round here are several varieties, growing in all sorts of places. Many grow on walls. From their green bases they send up capsules on a stalk - resembling tiny golf clubs. These capsules enclose myriads of spores. A cunning mechanism closes the capsule. Wedged shaped teeth attached to the rim point inwards. Only in dry weather do these open to allow the spores to escape. Those which find a favourable environment send out a threadlike filament which in turn develops into a moss plant, continuing to grow for many years, possibly covering several square inches of territory.
