Sixty or more years ago, history was largely the study of battles, with little or no interest to the ordinary citizens. The squabbles of the Wars of the Roses were fights between gangs of ruffians acting on the orders of ruthless paymasters.

These gangs quite cheerfully changed sides at the prospect of higher paysociates who recorded these events paid little attention to the lives of the

peasants, their thoughts and work. Certain drawings by artists of the period showed the processes of ploughing, sowing, reaping, etc.

Yet the basic needs of people were the same as they ever were - food, water, clothing, shelter, and security, and very few of the scholars able to read and write troubled to record the lives of peasants.

Written evidence is scarce, but much can be discovered by observation of what

Braunston would be a fairly attractive place for people to live in the early centuries of the Christian era or even before.
