VILLAGE NOTES.

LT the human race is concerned with the task of building a permanent home, the bird population is faced with this problem each year. In some cases an old nest may be refurbished but parasites lodging there often require that a fresh construction be made. Choosing a site may be a problem.

The loss of our elms must appear a tragedy to rooks and crows who have for many years used the upper branches of these trees where they could weave their platforms on twigs, springy yet strong and well out of reach of prowling cats.

The variety of forms of nests seems endless. The house sparrow collects straw and hay into an untidy heap - the hedge sparrow (or Dunnock) weaves a nest carefully lined with moss or hair, the thrush makes a nest lined with mud which when dried forms a hemisphere constructed with mathematical precision. Starlings and swallows build their nests of clay carefully lined and are so attractive that the untidy house sparrows turn out the rightful owners and occupy the nests themselves. Jealousy is not limited to the human race.

Some nests are works of art but plavers and seabirds content themselves with a hollow scraped in the ground, relying for protection on the colour of the eggs matching the earth on which they are laid. In this case the newly hatched chicks learn to look after themselves running around almost immediately after they leave the shell.



