The decline of the varieties of butterflies is indicative of the disappearance of many varieties of insects. 40 years ago 25 species of butterflies were observed in our neighbourhood but only 13 this year. This is reflected in the decrease in the number of bats flying in the evenings. These interesting animals developed their radar system long before our scientists gave us more sophisticated instruments. They emit a sound (inaudible to our ears), which echoes off anything solid in their path and thus allows them to fly in darkness or very dim light, while they search for insects.
