Although the village is as far from the seacoast as we can be we see many seagulls flying around, floating on reservoirs and the canal, as well as following ploughs, or haunting rubbish tips and in the evening groups are seen flying to Draycote Reservoir spend the night.

Formerly a flock of gulls seen inland was taken as foreshadowing rough weather at sea but now they seem to be regarded as land birds.

The gull most easily identified is the blackheaded gull. Close observation shows the black head is really a dark chocolate colour. It carries this colour in the breeding season. During the winter the colouring is reduced to a few feathers on the head.
