The effect on the butterfly population has been equally depressing. Generally Peacoc are abundant in August but few have appeared so far and even fewer Red Admirals. Appearing rather late have been small Tortoiseshells and Meadow Browns. One moth which seems to have been successful is the Ginnabar Moth. Their caterpillars with their rugby type jerseys of black and gold seem to say, "Anyone who eats me will regret it".
