VILLAGE NOTES: For farmers, gardeners, and holiday-makers we have experienced a disastrous summer not merely because of the abundant rainfall. (June 106.2mm (4 $\frac{1}{2}$ ins), July 44.5mm (1 $\frac{1}{2}$ ins.) and August to the 21st 49.5mm (approx. 2 ins.) but the long drawn out wet conditions have affected all.

Wildlife too has suffered. On one house last year 7 nests were built by martins but this year only 2 were completed.

The effect on the butterfly population has been equally depressing. Generally Peacocks are abundant in August but few have appeared so far and even fewer Red Admirals.

Appearing rather late have been small Tortoiseshells and Meadow Browns. One moth which seems to have been successful is the Ginnabar Moth. Their caterpillars with their rugby type jerseys of black and gold seem to say, "Anyone who eats me will regret it". As their food plants are groundsel and ragwort no one will grudge them their keep.
