but those of the Honey Bee hibernate in a hive provided by the beekeeper, in a hollow tree, in a house or barn loft where there is shelter from rain and snow.

The store of honey accumulated during the summer will be used up when the bees begin to stir from their sleep. This sometimes occurs in a mild spell in the winter and bees leaving the hive often perish in this way.

In 1904 many stocks of bees fell victims to a plague of Whites - a disease taking its name from the place of its first detection, the Isle of Wight.

So destructive was this disease that beekeepers had to replenish their stocks from bees imported from Italy. These have served in honey production and fertilization.
