Certain plants are able to live in conditions varying so widely that we are astonished at their endurance. Such are the Lichens. They cover tree trunks and bare rocks. Some look like crumpled bits of paper or splashes of paint, varying in colour through shades of grey, pale green and vivid yellow.

On their rocks they survive scorching sun of summer and bitter frost of winter.

Most remarkable is that they consist of two plants living together. One plant is a single celled green plant an alga and a fungus. Each partner provides the other with its needs, an example of what biologists term SYMBIOSIS, i.e. living together.
