WASTE PAPER COLLECTIONS

The Parochial Church Council of All Saints' Parish, Braunston wish to thank all those householders who have continued to put out their old newspapers and magazines for collection every first Saturday each month. The collections have been carried out regularly for over two years and we hope to continue in the New Year. Thanks are also due to the small band of helpers without whom the collections could not have been maintained.

Saturday 6th December

On this Saturday we are holding a Christmas Fayre at 10.30 am in the Village Centre. Will you please note therefore that the usual waste paper collection will take place but not until 2 pm - so please note this alteration to the usual time and put out your bundles of newspapers and magazines a little later on that day.

Saturday 13th December

The waste paper skip will be coming to Braunston on this day to collect the load which we will have waiting. Any able bodied villagers with an hour or so to spare will be welcomed in order to help us with the loading at about 9 am in Church Road.

There will be no collections during January but we will resume collections on Saturday 7th February from 9.30 am onwards.

The P.C.C. would be pleased to hear from anyone in Braunston who is able to offer the use of an outhouse, barn or similar building suitable for storing waste paper. Ideally the building should be detached and easily accessible for loading purposes.

Prices have dropped to a new low in recent months but we can maintain a reasonable level if we can store a larger amount for each skip load.

It is for this reason we put out this appeal for a suitable building.

Having established a regular collection service within the village we hope to continue this for many years to come.

VILLAGE NOTES

The migration of birds escaping to warmer climates from our winter receives much attention, but lesser migrations in Britain are worthy of note.

The Starlings which for some time have gathered in their communal roost at Bragborough seem to have found somewhere else. One evening the Braunston contingent gathered on an electric cable and flew off in a South Westerly direction to roost somewhere else, probably in a town where warmer quarters may be available.

The Curlew which makes such a mournful call over our upland moors, where it feeds on insects extracted by its long curved beak from muddy pools, finds that thick ice denies this source of food. He then migrates to the coast where the sea salt keeps the sand between the high and low water marks sufficiently soft for him to extract lug worms etc.

Insect life outdoors seems almost to have disappeared but the Winter Moth is still around. The wingless female crawls up apple trees to lay eggs from which caterpillars will emerge to feed on leaves in the spring. The males fly but how they manage to do this at such low temperatures is a wonder. A body not 2 mm wide cannot have insulation to retain heat in these cool, if not cold days of November, so how the wing muscles work is a constant source of wonder.
