There is something for every child to enter at the Village Show and the survival of these traditional events really do depend upon the enthusiasm of the young and their parents.

VILLAGE NOTES

Few people fail to appreciate the beauty of the various butterflies and moths which during the warm days brighten our gardens. It seems all the more remarkable that beautiful creatures like the Tortoiseshell, Red Admiral, Peacock and Painted Lady butterflies develop from caterpillars so ordinary that they only attract attention of students of insects' - except that of the gardeners waging a constant battle against the caterpillars of the Cabbage White butterfly and Cabbage Moth.

Adult butterflies do little to help their offspring beyond laying their eggs on or near plants which will provide a plentiful supply of food when they emerge from the egg. The eggs of the Small Tortoiseshell and the Red Admiral are mostly laid on the leaves of stinging nettles. The Clouded Yellows which were abundant in 1947 (and far less common since) lay their eggs on Lucerne and the closely related Mallow and Clover. The Angle shades Moth Caterpillar which we often dig up in the garden soil is able to live on groundsel dock or other herbaceous plant.

The Caterpillar of the Cinnabar Moth feeds on groundsel or ragwort. Its black

and yellow Jersey rugby style warns off would-be predators.

The most hated insect of all the caterpillars of the Cabbage White Butterfly emerges from an egg laid on a suitable food plant - a plant of the cabbage variety or one of its relatives, the radish, horse radish or even nasturtium leaves.

The butterflies themselves prefer to extract nectar from flowers or the juice from fruit like plums.
