VILLAGE NOTES People are occasionally struck by a fear which other people think is utterly unreasonable. A fear of cats is to most of us quite unreasonable. What harm can be in cuddly pussy. A similar fear is felt towards a spider. With the exception of certain foreign spiders - only to be found in zoos etc. The homebred spider does not bite or sting. In fact though his web may be a nuisance and occasionally to the tidy housewife, he is quite harmless. Possessing eight legs against the six marking the insect, he is classed alongside the crab. If we look at a spider's web it is a marvel of engineering construction, considering that with so little expenditure of material he can make a structure capable of holding an insect many times his own weight and strength. The thread spun from its own body dries almost at once to make a filament capable of taking great strain. The insect trapped can be quickly rendered helpless by an injection from the spider and if necessary can be wrapped in a cocoon and left until required. We shall see in warm weather another use for the threads spun by tiny spiders. They spin a length of cocoon which they use as parachutes on which they can float in a slight breeze for a considerable distance. The advantages conferred by the spider far outweigh any inconvenience.
